

REQUEST A STREET TREE

Every resident in the City of Albany can request a free street tree for their verge.

Trees cool us down, improve air quality, provide habitat, and make our neighborhoods look and feel better.

Available trees are listed below and are subject to availability, supply, and budget.

If you are unsure what species is suitable for your verge, you can tick the "No preference" option on the request form.

Trees are planted over the winter months to give them the best chance to thrive. Requests can be made up until **1 April 2024** to be included in the winter planting season. Requests made after the 1 April 2024 will be included in the next years planting program.



Common / Botanical Name	Origin	Tree Size	Suitability under powerlines	Description
Peppermint Tree Angonis flexuosa	WA Native	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Pruning required	An important habitat and shade tree for our local fauna, especially for Western Ringtail Possums.
Dwarf Sugar Gum Eucalyptus cladocalyx nana	Australian Native	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Pruning required	A dwarf cultivar of the Sugar Gum, this attractive shade and habitat tree has smooth grey bark and pointed green leaves. Creamy white flowers during Summer.

Common / Botanical Name	Origin	Tree Size	Suitability under powerlines	Description
Dwarf Yellow Bloodwood <i>Corymbia eximia nana</i>	Australian Native	 <i>Small (4 to 8 metres)</i>	Suitable	Small tree with a gnarly trunk, broad leaves and eye-catching creamy yellow flowers in Spring.
Coral Gum <i>Eucalyptus torquata</i>	WA Native	 <i>Medium (8 to 16 metres)</i>	Not suitable	Native to the Goldfields Region of Western Australia, an attractive small to medium shade tree with rough greyish bark and blue-green foliage. Large coral-pink flowers bloom from August to December.
Snow Queen <i>Eucalyptus victrix</i>	WA Native	 <i>Medium (8 to 16 metres)</i>	Not suitable	Also known as the 'Little Ghost Gum', this small tree has smooth white bark. Creamy-white flowers in Spring and Summer. Tolerates drought and heavier soils. Wind tolerant.
Broadleaf Paperbark <i>Melaleuca quinquinerva</i>	Australian Native	 <i>Medium (8 to 16 metres)</i>	Pruning required	Soft, papery bark and white bottlebrush-like flowers Spring through to Autumn. Examples at different ages can be seen in the ALAC carpark. Suitable for wet areas.

Common / Botanical Name	Origin	Tree Size	Suitability under powerlines	Description
Swamp Paperbark Melaleuca raphiophylla	WA Native	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Not suitable	Grows up to 10m high with powdery bark and cream flowers from Spring to Summer. This WA native is suitable for wet areas near swamps and watercourses.
Chanticleer Pear Pyrus chanticleer	Exotic	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Not suitable	An upright ornamental pear with a dense habit, masses of spring flowers and attractive foliage throughout summer and autumn. Excellent for sites where lateral space is restricted.
Manchurian Pear Pyrus ussuriensis	Exotic	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Not suitable	Glossy dark green leaves through Spring and Summer with striking Autumn foliage. White flowers in early spring are pale pink in bud. Ideal summer shade tree.
Claret Ash Fraxinus oxycarpa	Exotic	 Medium (8 to 16 metres)	Not suitable	A large shade tree with beautiful autumn foliage. Moderate to fast growth rate, suited to large verges.
