

EMU BEACH COASTAL MANAGEMENT WORKS

PROJECT SCOPE + OBJECTIVES

The coastal dunes stretching from Middleton Beach to Emu Beach serve a dual purpose: they provide a natural defence against coastal erosion and act as vital environmental habitat.

Ongoing natural processes — including wave action, tides, and storms — cause sand to erode from the dunes and shift westwards along the shoreline. Each year, the City of Albany undertakes seasonal recovery of this sand, typically from areas below the high tide line, and redistributes it to restore eroded sections of the beach.

This short-term sand nourishment work aims to:

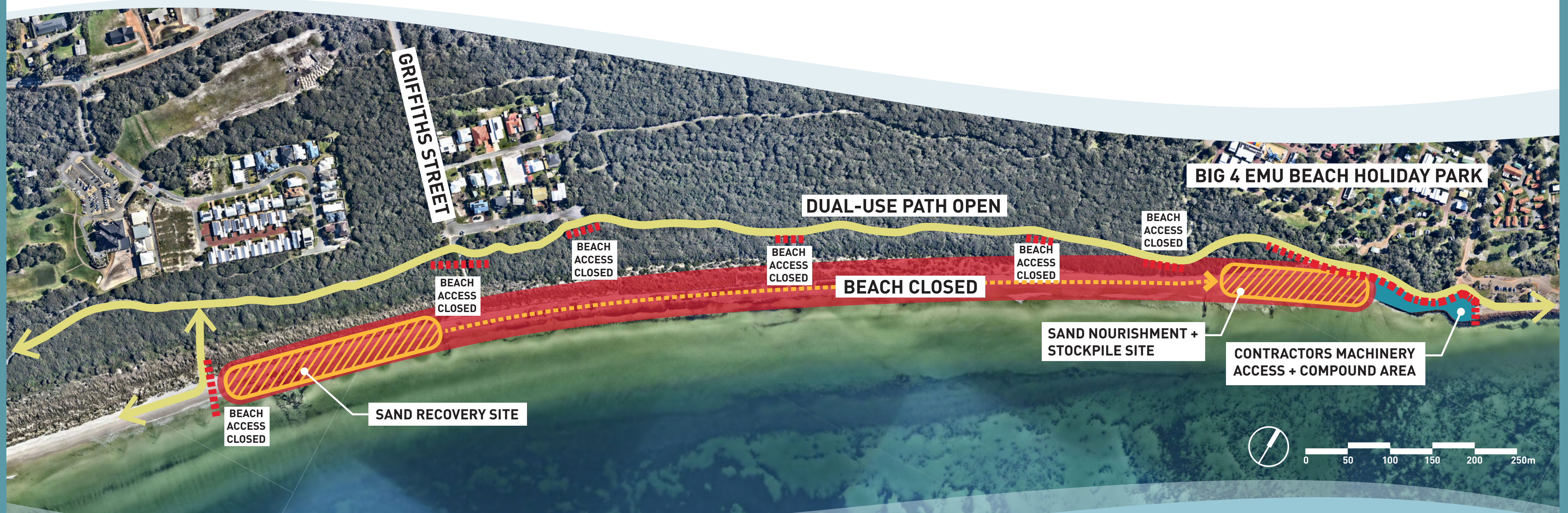
- Improve beach amenity and reinforce erosion buffers at Emu Beach.
- Replace sand lost annually from the dunes.
- Interim measure while longer-term management solutions continue to be developed.

These works are co-sponsored by Department of Transport as part of the Coastal Adaptation Protection (CAP) Grant.

BEACH ACCESS + CLOSURES

To ensure public safety during the works, a section of Emu Beach will be closed from Griffiths Street. However, the dual-use path from Middleton Beach to Emu Point will remain open throughout the project.

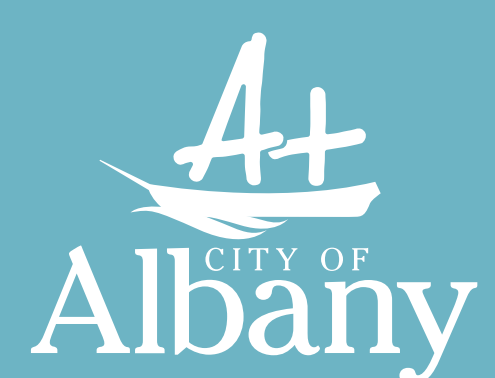

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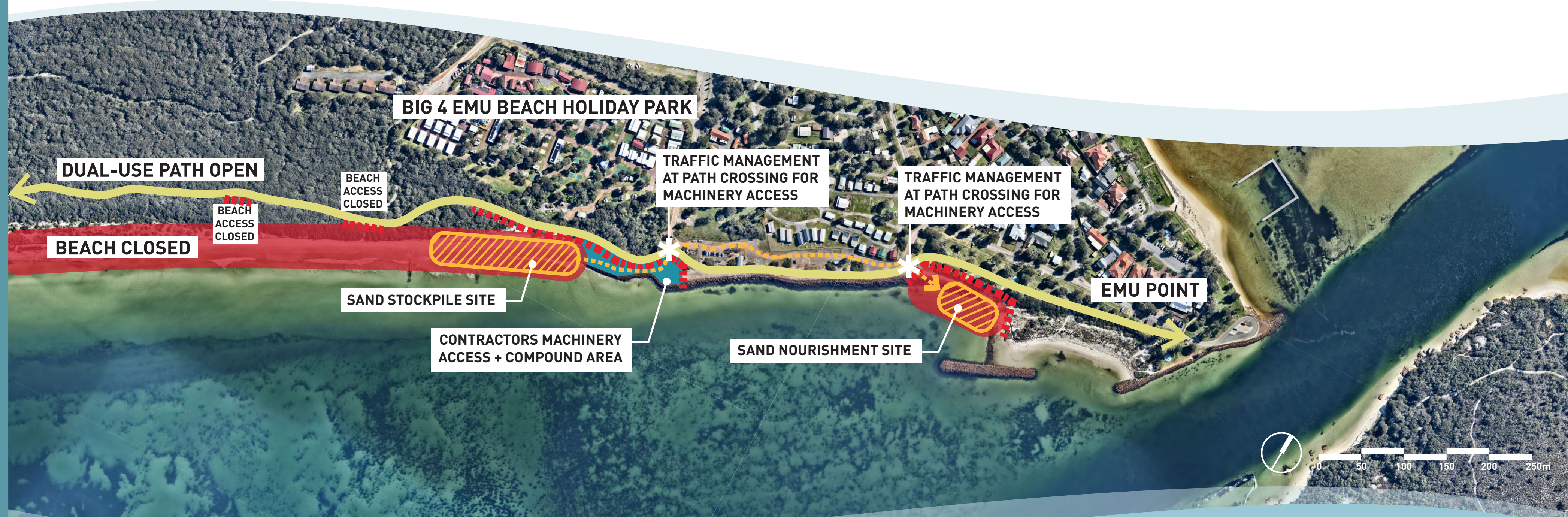
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
