

DOWN ROAD NOISE AND HAZARD MANAGEMENT POLICY

I am writing to support the establishment of the Down Road Timber Processing Precinct, Albany.

As an adjacent owner of Lots 5777 and 5778, North of the proposed Precinct the Lots will be impacted by the City of Albany Noise and Hazard Management Policy.

The Policy is understood to establish a Noise and Hazard Buffer to maintain a suitable separation distance between the proposed industries and residential housing. The impact to Lots 5777 and 5778 from the Policy would disallow any habitable structures being developed.

On the 20th September 2005, LandCorp made an offer of payment in recognition of the impact from the Noise and Hazard Management Policy. The valuation methodology was discussed and the offer made in accordance with valuation advice from the Valuers General Office.

Although payment is yet to be formalised, as owner of Lot 5777 and 5778 I/we principally agree to the offer made by LandCorp for agreement to Lodge a Notice on title referring to impact on land by the City of Albany Noise and Hazard Management Policy.

DOWN ROAD TIMBER PROCESSING PRECINCT NOISE POLICY. REF: A171237A

We would like to lodge a submission opposing the policy for the reasons stated below.

- Council gave approval for the current chip mill to commence operation, providing noise levels
 are kept to an industry acceptable level. Information we have received indicates that the noise
 level of the mill grossly exceeds an acceptable level. With the right conditions we can hear the
 mill operating at night on our properties at Marbelup North rd A5956-726, and Albany Hwy.
- Our property West of the timber processing precinct is approximately 700 acres on two titles. It
 has two pristine flowing creeks, and elevated hills which have 360 degree sweeping views.

Development of the precinct will not only have a noise impact on our property, but visual, and possibly odors from the mill.

The timber processing precinct will seriously devalue our property because of the above factors as well as removing options for future subdivision and building.

We are not being compensated for the impact the timber processing precinct will have on our property.

3) We would be more supportive of the development of the precinct if the council had managed and policed the levels of noise from the existing chip mill.

We are skeptical of the development, considering that three more chip mills may be commissioned, and believe that the noise levels would render our current residence uninhabitable.

We are by no means against development for Albany's Industry, we are business owners ourselves and understand the need for development to create more jobs.

However, unless many of the issues we have mentioned above are addressed, namely the noise level factor, this will cause problems for the development proceeding, as well as issues for the local residents.

We would appreciate if you would seriously consider our concerns

We are writing to you on behalf of the Redmond Fighting Group, which is a group of concerned residents living and farming in the vicinity of the Down Road Woodchip Mill near Albany.

Our Group have a number of concerns, regarding not only the existing Woodchip Mill, but also future proposed developments, including another Woodchip Mill, Lignor's Strand Lumber Plant and Beacon's Consulting biomass project.

These concerns include:

- Noise pollution
- Visual impact
- Locating industry in a water catchment area
- Future developments being located outside the Mirambeena Industrial Estate
- Apparent haphazard rezoning occurring
- Concerns relating to the ramifications of a buffer zone
- No liaison occurring between residents and proponents of the proposed developments

The community feels that there is a lack of communication and we require more information immediately so that submissions of public comment can be completed by 22 September 2005.

Local authorities have not been forthcoming with information, when questioned by local residents, and we are becoming increasingly frustrated as we feel our concerns are not being addressed at any level.

This is now a matter of urgency as Local Government initially voted against public comment and has now left us with limited knowledge of the proposed developments and little time to compile our submissions.

We would greatly appreciate your assistance in this matter and look forward to your prompt reply.

I am **extremely concerned** environmentally with the proposed development of the Down Road Timber Processing Precinct.

The site is **not gazetted industrial area**. 

Even with good pollution control technology & practice, these industries will have **residual emissions** of pollutants which **cannot practicably be avoided -----** i.e.**noise, hazardous chemicals, gas, dust, & fumes.**Future plans incorporate several Chip Mills, Lignor's Processing Plant, Beacons' Biomass Energy Plant.

How could such a development be allowed to go ahead on the pristine waterways of the Marbelup Brook (future water source for City of Albany) putting the whole Torbay Catchment at risk just because you find it too difficult to find other solutions.

Environmentally this "proposed development" on the Marbelup Brook must be treated as a matter of urgency.

Dear Mr Hammond,

I'm writing to you as a resident of Redmond deeply concerned about the current and future proposed developments at the Mirambeena Industrial Estate in Down Road, Redmond.

Current noises from the existing chip mill can be heard from my residence in the Redmond townsite some 5-7 km's away, despite being told by the local authorities prior to the construction of the mill that this would not be a problem as strict measures/conditions had been implemented to ensure this would not occur.

I'm puzzled at the choice of location for an industrial estate and even more confused at the EPA's decision regarding the rezoning of land to accommodate for more chipping mills, the Beacon's Consulting Biomass Power Plant and Lignor Engineered Strand Lumbar Plant, when this land lies within the Marbellup Creek Catchment area, which to my knowledge has been earmarked as a valuable future water supply to Albany.

I've read that Clifford Jones from the Beacon's Consulting Biomass Power Plant confirmed that the clean green thinking behind the proposed development would result in no pollution and have no impact on the Marbellup Creek Catchment, well that's the sort of promises I got about the noise impact from the current chip mill and I can still hear it from my residence, not to mention the pollution and noise impact heavy vehicles will have entering right through the middle of the Redmond townsite to access Marbellup Road, should that proposed development go ahead.

While it's encouraging to see the economic value these proposed developments will bring to the Albany region, they can equally have a devastating impact on the environment in more than one way. Surely a Environmental Impact Assessment is necessary to ensure these developments are not just economically viable but also environmentally sustainable and friendly to <u>all</u> concerned.

In conclusion, I would like to request that the noise emissions from the existing chip mill are looked into and rectified and serious considerations are given to noise impact, airborne emissions and water management programs for any future developments in the Albany region.



We have plans for an inert non-toxic building waste receival facility.

Industrial composting is suited to this property and our activities.

We have offered to spray irrigate Water Corporation's treated waste water. Grow sandalwood as a joint venture using sandalwood factory waste water. This demonstrates our willingness to work with our neighbours and we are open to any proposal which has mutual benefit.

There are serious concerns with the hazard risk area and we quote from the State Industrial Buffer Policy, "Even with good pollution control, technology and practice these industries [and others that will follow] often have residual emissions of pollutants which cannot practicably be avoided (ie gas, odour, dust, noise). In addition, there may be unavoidable risk of injury or death from accidents associated with industrial activity or the storage of dangerous goods."

Alcoa regularly spills caustic solution (50 000 litres on one occasion). Computer error, malfunction, valve solenoids are used as excuses. Human error and accidents are real and do happen. Statements by the SIB policy, Landcorp and City of Albany regarding the noise and hazard buffer "This will provide protection for surrounding landowners and give security to industry operating within the TPP". This is at our expense. We demand to be paid for this protection and security we provide, by those who collectively profit from this privilege at our expense.

Industry, our state WA and the wider community benefit greatly from the resource processing sector. During 1992-1993 it directly employed 6.3% of the states's workforce and contributed 31.8% of the gross state product, equivalent to \$11 billion acontributed These statistics from the SIB policy are now 12 years old. This is huge. We do not have the current statistic and believe it to be enormous.

Now with three buffers, our property is used to benefit the wider community, City of Albany and WA. It is only fair and reasonable that this is acknowledged. Currently we can work and farm this property. In addition to this, we live and work with the high risk of being injured, burnt and even killed within the industrialist hazard buffer zone. In the near future we will be severely disadvantaged not being able to build a house on preferred locations and losing the opportunity to sub divide for residential development. Our 1342 acres property has three road frontage and is 10km from the city centre. This property is larger than two square miles, making it unique and for this reason very valuable real estate.

We are prepared to negotiate a positive outcome for mutual benefit and will not have the hazard/noise buffer on our title until this happens.

It is now a user pays society. Those who benefit need to be mindful that there are costs to be paid for their benefits. We are simply seeking (as we are sure you would agree) a 'fair crack of the whip' for a fair go.







TOWN PLANNING SCHEME No 3 AMENDMENT No 238

I refer to your letter of 13 April 2005 and advise that the Minister for Planning and Infrastructure:

- determined the submissions in accordance with Council's resolution, as conveyed in the Schedule of Submissions;
- has decided not to approve the above amendment until such time as the modifications set out in the attached Schedule are effected; and
- requires Council to advertise and adopt the Noise and Hazard Management Policy for the land.

The Minister also requests that the proponents:

- (a) confirm that the Environmental Management Plan includes measures which ensure that discharge will not affect the P3 status of the proposed water catchment; and
- (b) continue negotiations with all affected landowners concerning ex-gratia payment in respect of a notification pursuant to section 70A of the *Transfer of the Land Act 1893* on the Certificates of Title of lots subject to the Noise and Hazard Management Policy.

Would you please arrange for three sets of amending documents to be prepared and executed in accordance with the modifications required and submit them for the Minister's endorsement of final approval. At the same time, it would save on the advertising costs (approximately 25%) if a disc containing the scheme text were submitted. Alternatively, the text can be emailed to Helen.Aitken@dpi.wa.gov.au.

In accordance with the provisions of regulations 21 (2) and 25 of the *Town Planning Regulations*, 1967 (as amended), Council is required to return the executed modified amending documents to the Commission within 42 days of being notified of the Minister's decision.

One set of amending documents is returned herewith for the purpose.



When returning the documents to the Commission, please forward them directly to our Albany Regional Office. This will alleviate any delays in the processing of the amendment.

Re: Comment on Draft Local Planning Policy - Design Guidelines - Masonic Hall

We are writing in response to your letter, dated 23 August 2005, regarding your Draft Local Planning Policy – Design Guidelines document for the Earl Street Masonic Hall site.

We have been City of Albany ratepayers for some considerable time, having owned and lived, firstly at 82 Spencer Street, and since 2002, at the above address.......in total in the Albany CBD for close to 13 years. We also owned a vacant block of land in Earl Street [near Bridges St intersection] but despite our love of the "Harbour Aspect", found building costs prohibitive for furthering the project. Consequently, it is clearly evident that our hearts and those of our young family are in Albany, especially the CBD, and we have quite an interest in what will/will not happen to that section of the City, particularly to existing buildings and new constructions in the "heritage saddle" area of the City.

About three years ago, we spent a considerable amount of money on plans to extend our Spencer Street cottage. The council only passed the plans if they adhered to the regulation that the street-scape remained undisturbed. In addition, we were required to comply with council guidelines on building materials and colour – principles we actually agreed with. It is hoped and suggested that strict adherence to such "community and environmentally – minded concepts is strictly followed and is closely and carefully monitored by the City of Albany.

We agree wholeheartedly with the objective of the afore-mentioned Guidelines, namely to ensure that any future developments on Lots 26,27 &28 are sympathetic to the built form of the Masonic Hall, in consideration of height, bulk and scale, roof pitch, colours and materials. It is also of personal interest to us as owners of the adjacent property that any developments on the Masonic Hall site are also sympathetic to all its neighbours in building function, design and situation on each of the Lots. We are well aware that "no-one has a right to a view" but it would of benefit to all of Albany, especially of course the adjacent properties, that any developments around the Masonic Hall are done to minimize any impact on view and aspect of adjoining houses.......the view of Albany Harbour is one to be savoured, respected and shared by all.

In relation to the Development requirements section of the Draft policy document, our knowledge of the specifics is limited and can only assume and hope that they are intended to allow buildings to be constructed that in no way detract from the feeling, the view and the ambience of the Masonic Hall site. Regarding the "setbacks", although not clear from the document, it is hoped that the major portion of any construction is located on the "rear" [or Earl

Street] section of each block, thereby allowing any new buildings – particularly on Lots 27 & 28 - to be as inconspicuous as possible in relation to the Masonic Hall building. The roof pitch and materials appear sensitive to the surroundings but it is suggested that the materials used are in no way "shiny" and thereby minimize any reflective impact of the structures. The "Building Height" section is somewhat difficult to comprehend, but having a height of 8.5 metres in the Building Envelope is significant, and will possibly have a considerable impact on our and their privacy. Nonetheless, we are aware that such high-density dwellings have a place in the CBD of any city.....hopefully, one that adds a positive community aspect to the area yet does not compromise the privacy of its residents.

We readily acknowledge and support your Council's intention to stimulate business and people activity in the Albany CBD, but we also readily acknowledge the need for careful planning for the City's future, which must revolve around both building on the current strengths, as well as minimizing any disruptive elements of the local community and environment. renowned nationally, if not internationally, for its strong links with Australia's past, as well as being the owner of some classic and historical meaningful treasures, thereby providing a visible and Inappropriate attention and consideration to such tangible connection to our heritage. community assets smacks of sheer vandalism, with lazy and shoddy planning furthering the neglect and debasement. In our eyes, this has and continues to happen by way of the Council's recent action/inaction, and has seriously eroded the protection of major heritage "gems" [such as Kookas and the Albany Court-House]. In the name of "architectural continuity", an attempt has been made to connect the "old with the new" at the Justice Complex site and what is resulting is a bastardisation of both styles. What seems to have been forgotten by the associated businesspeople, architects and politicians is "context" - and juxta-positioning of such contrasting styles defaces both. I therefore encourage and support your intended strict policy for constructions on the Masonic Hall site so that there is a definite and careful blending of the "old with the new" with the former leading the way to determine the latter.

I am sure that there is no need to remind you of the endorsed 2005 City of Albany Tourism Strategy document, in which you – the combined Council - clearly state that you are committed to ensuring "..... that new developments and land uses do not threaten the Natural and cultural heritage values that make the City so unique and desirable as a tourist destination". Please be true to your word.

On behalf of the Masonic Hall Company Pty Ltd, I have been requested to make application to Council to approve/allow access from Spencer Street to the two lots proposed in the sub-division for access for vehicles and garaging.

Background — We have found it increasingly difficult if not impossible to provide the vehicle access via one drive way off Spencer Street for both lots and provide a reasonable size lot [26] to build on. The sewer easement on the southern portion of lot 26 approximately 3 metre has reduced the building envelope [copy of diagram attached]. This has lead us to reconsider the options available, it would seem the best for us to do is request approval for access off Spencer Street which would allow either a driveway onto the lots or allow partial under-croft parking on the lots so that both lots can be catered for.

We are currently negotiating with buyer for the Hall – they have all indicated their proposed use for the building is residential – that being the case we would not expect a huge amount for traffic flow from the Hall site and as lot 26 is residential, the traffic flow there should also be minimal.

Your assistance in this matter would be much appreciated as we hope to conclude contracts in the near future.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Scheme Amendment Request is in relation to the existing Special Rural Zone No.4A, Nanarup and Mead Roads, Kalgan.

The proposal is to amend the City of Albany's Town Planning Scheme (TPS) No.3 by modifying the Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan of Special Rural Zone No.4A.

At present 9 of the 11 land landowners are not able to realise the full potential of land, bases on sustainability principles, reflected in the current subdivision guide plan and scheme provisions that are not consistent with those recently created for Special Rural Zones in the City of Albany's TPS No.3.

This amendment will enable greater flexibility in development options and improved management practices, while retaining the purpose and intent of Special Rural Zone No.4A and its compatibility with surrounding and nearby land uses.

2.0 LOCATION AND SITE

2.1 Location

Special Rural Zone No.4A is located approximately 15 kilometres north east of the Albany CBD. The site is bounded by Mead Road to the north and west, Nanarup Road to the south and by the Kalgan River reserve to the east. The subject land is to the north-west of the Kalgan Heights Special Residential zone development and north-east of the Gull Rock Special Rural zone development. The adjoining land to the north, east and west is currently used for rural purposes and the Great Southern Grammar School is directly to the south. Refer to Map1 for details.

2.2 Site and Land Ownership

Special Rural Zone No.4A consists of 13 lots, which have 11 different landowners, and range in size from 8.1 hectares (ha) to 28.5 ha. 9 of the 11 current landowners are involved with the project.

The owner of Lots 23,24,25 and 241 to the north of Aldo Road did not respond to requests to be involved. However is understood they are a farming family and are happy to continue the current grazing activities. The retention of this area for larger lots is more in keeping with surrounding lot sizes and existing farming activities and will not have an adverse impact on the main component of the Special Rural zone between Aldo and Nanarup Roads.

The owner of Lot 27 supports the proposed rationalization of the existing zone but is happy with the current size of his lot and as it is largely cleared and easier to manage.

The table following table summarises the owner involvement status. Refer to Map 2 for the location of lots.

2.3 Land Capability and Surrounding Uses

The site has three different land capability ratings, Ds, BWo and V7. A comprehensive analysis of the land capability is undertaken in 6.0.

The subject land is surrounded by rural activities and is constrained by the River and Mead Road. However there are a number of small rural/residential developments near the subject land, such as to the west at Prideaux Road and to the southeast the Gull Rock Road special rural zone development that has a minimum lot size of 2 ha. The proposed amendment would merely represent an extension of existing rural/residential and special rural developments to the east.

2.4 Site Constraints and Opportunities

The existing owners of Special Rural Zone No.4A want to retain the existing character of the site and reflect this in the amendment. The site can offer lifestyle opportunities, with high quality housing and the amenity of the Kalgan River. This objective can be achieved by amending the existing Subdivision Guide Plan and Scheme Provisions to provide the opportunity to introduce more sustainable management controls over the site.

The site the land generally ranges from a low point on some 0-45 metres AHD on Lot 19 to 45 metres ADH on Lots 17 & 18. There is also a low-lying area on Lots 29 & 30 along the Nanarup Road boundary land being constraints to further development as these areas that often are waterlogged in winter. The site is also covered by extensive remnant vegetation, and it is a goal of landowners to retain this vegetation cover and add to it with additional plantings. However, the increase in lot yields on lots with significant remnant vegetation will be restricted. For details refer to Map 3.

The present foreshore reserve incorporates the foreshore remnant vegetation strip and provides an adequate buffer to the Kalgan River. Apart from standard set back

requirements the foreshore reserve is not a major development constraint. Therefore the foreshore will continue to be protected as part of this proposal.

The other constraint of Special Rural Zone No.4A is fire hazards, with portions of the site as either having a prone or extreme fire hazard. The proposed amendment will take this into account and it will become an opportunity for the site to introduce strategic firebreaks and building hazard protection areas not currently in the scheme.

3.0 ZONING

The subject land is zoned Special Rural Zone No.4A in the City of Albany TPS No.3.

The land adjoining the proposed amendment is zoned rural to the north, south and west, with land zoned reserve next to the Kalgan River. There is also a caravan park site to the southeast adjoining the site. However within close proximity to the site are higher density residential and rural subdivisions, such as those at Kalgan Heights and along Prideaux Road.

Special Rural Zone No.4A is controlled by scheme provisions, some of these being:

- -A minimum lot size of 8 ha
- -Smallholdings with a primary purpose of hobby farming
- -And the following uses are permitted:
- -Residential Dwelling House
- -Stables and Livestock Grazing
- -Horticulture and Viticulture
- -And Public Recreation

As the Scheme Provisions came into force on the 23rd of September 1985 they are not consistent with the present context of planning and development of Special Rural Zones in Albany. For example the land was unable to be used for tourism purposes, even though the Kalgan River is used for such purposes. The current Scheme Provisions, such as a minimum lot size of 8 ha, with an objective of the dominant land use being hobby farming, differ from current demand with residents mostly seeking smaller lots related rural lifestyle opportunities such as recreation and low level non-commercial activities such as gardening.

It is proposed to alter the Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan so the subject land is more sensitive to the current land development market, existing environmental constraints and improved land management.

4.0 STRATEGIC PLANS

4.1 Albany Local Planning Strategy

The Draft Albany Local Planning Strategy (ALPS) was prepared for the City of Albany in 2001. The consultant report identified a number of precincts within the City, including Oyster Harbour Precinct 11A. In this document the subject land is classified as land for Longer Term Residential purposes. It is suggested within this strategy that foreshore and visual qualities in this 'residential expansion node' need to be retained and are highly regarded. It also mentions that Special Rural Subdivision

should be away from prime agricultural areas, by which the subject land complies. However this strategy is being reviewed as part of the finalisation of the Albany Local Planning Strategy for the City of Albany.

4.2 Local Rural Strategy 1996

Special Rural Zone No.4A is not mentioned in the City of Albany's Local Rural Strategy. However the document does have relevance to the proposed amendment. Land adjacent to the subject land, on Mead and Nanarup Roads is classified in the text as Oyster Harbour 11. The policy document states that any rural/residential development has to undertake comprehensive revegetation, fencing off remnant vegetation, have sealed road access, and that nutrient losses be prevented or minimized within acceptable limits to Oyster Harbour. The proposed amendment will fully address these issues, even though it is not in the Strategy area.

4.3 Residential Expansion Strategy 1994

Special Rural Zone No.4A is not included in the 1994 Residential Expansion Strategy.

4.4 Planning for Bush Fire Protection 2001

The modifications to the Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan will address issues such as bush fire prevention on the subject land, and follow policy and guidelines mentioned in the Planning for Bush Fire Protection policy document. Appropriate fire prevention and management measures will be incorporated into any development and subdivision resulting from the proposed amendment.

5.0 INFRASTRUCTURE

5.1 Roads and Access

Access to the site is available from either Nanarup or Mead Roads. These roads are at a suitable standard and able to accommodate traffic flow generated by the proposed amendment. Any additional access points caused by the proposal will be limited from Nanarup Road. Any subdivision resulting from the proposed amendment will provide access for fire and emergency services, as guidelines recommend in the Planning for Bush Fire Protection policy document. This will include adequate access and measures, as portions of the site have been noted as areas prone to, or of extreme fire risk.

5.2 Services

Reticulated power and telecommunications are available for use on the subject land. Reticulated water is also available along Mead and Nanarup Road to Lot 20. This water supply can be easily extended to accommodate further lots north of Lot 20.

Deep sewer services are not currently available at the site. Therefore effluent will be need to disposed of onsite. Future effluent disposal can be better controlled through additional Scheme Provisions, to minimise the environmental impact. Under new

scheme provisions, strict guidelines will be set as to how residents treat and dispose of effluent, so as not to affect the Kalgan River, especially adverse nutrient loadings.

Reticulated gas is not available at the site. Refer to Map 2 for details.

5.3 Drainage

At present the subject land is serviced by adequate drainage. The proposed amendment and any development will be required to dispose of surface run-off onsite.

5.4 Character and Amenity

The subject land has a rural character, with quality homes and properties set among remnant vegetation, with some involved in small agricultural pursuits. The existing character of Special Rural Zone No.4A will be maintained by the proposed amendment, with measures such as retaining remnant vegetation and revegetation to be undertaken in any resulting subdivision proposal. The proposal identifies the site as being visually significant and will take measures to reduce the visual impact of an increased number of lots and dwellings. The area has a rare opportunity to allow for a limited increase in lots while protecting the existing character and amenity, especially the Kalgan River.

6.0 LAND CAPABILITIES

The land capability rating of Ds is the most appropriate for development within the subject land, with a fair capability of supporting housing development but and low capability of effluent disposal. In this area is where the most opportunity exists for an increased number of lots. This land has a good foundation stability, high rain acceptance and minimal risk of flooding. To address special onsite effluent disposal issues, alternative treatment systems for effluent will be introduced into the Scheme Provisions. Also issues, such as erosion of this land unit would be addressed, with incorporation of adequate drainage and land stabilisation measures.

The land capability unit BWo has both a low capability of supporting housing development and onsite effluent disposal. However a reduced lot size is appropriate for this unit, and within the modified Scheme Provisions issues will be addressed such as appropriate effluent disposal measures and construction of dwellings above the highest recorded flood level. Also any new subdivision proposal will have to incorporate development exclusion areas, to exclude any land, such as that subject to flooding, from development.

The land capability of V7 is the lowest of the three units, with both a low capability of supporting onsite effluent disposal, and housing development. As mentioned before, low-lying areas that have experienced flooding in the past will be included in development exclusion zones. This area has a high water erosion risk, so it important to incorporate erosion reduction measures to this land capability unit. Within this land capability unit, a minimal number of lots shall be created, as to be sympathetic to the needs of the subject land. The table below shows the capability ratings of the subject land. For details on their location refer to Map 4 for details.

7.0 AMENDMENT PROPOSAL

The proposal is to amend the current Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan in Special Rural Zone 4A, under the City of Albany's TPS No.3. The adjustment of the scheme provisions will allow the site to better reflect the lifestyle choices and up to date effluent disposal systems, and allow for an extension of special rural developments that reflect the current demand.

10 of the 11 existing landowners support the proposal with the other not responding to requests to be involved. However, this land owner has the 3 lots to the north of Aldo Road that are currently used for grazing purposes whereas the balance of lots between Aldo and Nanarup Roads are currently being used as large lifestyle lots.

Under the current Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan the subject land is unable to be developed further due to a minimum lot size of 8 ha. This limits development potential in the area. The increase in a sustainable lot yields within the existing Zone 4A between Aldo Close and Nanarup Road reduces the need to rezone additional farming land to meet market demand for lots. Based on the preliminary

constraints and opportunities assessment the lot sizes would range from approximately 1 or 2 ha, with a higher average lot size of approximately 3 to 4 ha..

The current Scheme Provisions are inadequate. The subject land, instead of being highly demanded for small rural pursuits, as was the case 20 years ago, is now highly demanded for lifestyle opportunities that reflect smaller lots, near to the high amenity values of the Kalgan River. The subject land is also close to the Great Southern Grammar educational facility that is in high demand, and one of Albany's premier rapidly expanding educational institutes. This facility is encouraging more families into the area and reflects a demand for family orientated developments on smaller lots

Access to the subject land will be obtained from both Nanarup and Mead Roads. The proposed amendment will not have any adverse affect on traffic flow, nor will it generate flows beyond the capacity of either road.

The services of reticulated water, power and telecommunications are either available, or can be extended to all of Special Rural Area 4A, if required. Sewer is not available, therefore effluent disposal will be on-site with methods that will minimise environmental impact. Reticulated gas is not available to the subject land.


The subject land is capable of supporting the proposed amendment, and the land capability issues still being addressed with smaller lot sizes than currently allowed unde the existing scheme provisions. On site effluent disposal issues can be adequately addressed with the extensive use of alternative effluent disposal systems, to reduce the impact of the proposal on the environment. Scheme Provisions will be included which will incorporate development exclusion areas, erosion management, appropriate housing construction and nutrient management, allowing a land management program much better than that provided in the existing scheme provisions.

8.0 CONCLUSIONS

This report has demonstrated that the proposed modifications to the Scheme Provisions with the creation of lot sizes that have regard to the sites constraints and opportunities through a revised Subdivision Guide Plan will cater for the demand for such special rural lots in Albany, near to the popular and expanding Kalgan and Oyster Harbour localities. This will be done in a sustainable manner, especially with no additional valuable farm land being lost as a result of an additional rezoning

It is hereby requested that the Council support the preparation of a formal Amendment to the City of Albany's Town Planning Scheme No.3 to modify the existing Scheme Provisions and Subdivision Guide Plan applying to Special Rural Zone No.4A, Mead and Nanarup Roads, Kalgan.







1.0 INTRODUCTION

This Scheme Amendment Report gives the background to and support for a proposal for Part Lot 376, La Perouse Road, Goode Beach, to change the existing 'Additional Use' in Schedule 2 of the City of Albany's Town Planning Scheme No.3 from a Residential R 10 coding and a Shop use located in the south-east corner of the block to a Residential R 12.5 coding.

The Goode Beach locality provides for a variety of lifestyle and housing choices ranging from larger special rural and special residential lots to smaller residential lots within Residential R10/R12.5 zones. The residents of Goode Beach have existing local shopping facilities at Little Grove and a shop at Frenchman Bay Tea Rooms also supported by a caravan park and passing traffic to local tourist destinations, such as Whale World. Refer to the Location Plan for details.

The purpose of this proposal is to provide for three residential lots on the subject land that complement existing surrounding residential development and the amenity of the locality and support existing local shopping facilities.

2.0 BACKGROUND


Part Lot 376 has an area of 2,598m² and is in the locality of Goode Beach. The lot has dual road frontage to both La Perouse Road and Klem Road with a narrow pedestrian access way running down its western boundary.

The subject site is cleared, with some large trees remaining and contains no development. The site is bounded by 'Residential' zoned lots to the north, south and west, with an access way separating the western boundary from Lot 226. Residential development has occurred to the north, south, east and west of the subject site.

The Goode Beach locality is surrounded by Parks and Recreation Reserves to the north and south, Frenchman Bay to the east, and 'Special Rural' Zones and 'Public Purposes Reserves' to the west.

Recognising the low retail catchment of Goode Beach and constraints to further residential development that could not support a local shopping 17 December 2002 Council granted final approval to rezone adjoining Lot 226 from the 'Local Shopping' Zone to 'Residential' Zone.

Following consideration of a subsequent amendment on Part Lot 376 Council at its meeting of 20 April 2004 granted final approval to an amendment to rezone Pt Lot 376 from 'Local Shopping' to Residential R12.5 (3 residential lots) on the grounds that the commercial strategy does not support the need for an additional local shop as the occasional daily needs of residents can be met by the nearby Frenchman Bay Tearooms that include a shop. As part of the advertising process it was established that the community did not support a shop due to an increase in traffic and visual impact of the shop and associated car park in an existing quiet residential area. However, Council's recommendation was not supported by the Hon. Minister for Planning and Infrastructure. The Minister approved the replacement of the 'Local Shopping' Zone with a 'Residential R 10' Zone comprising and a 'Shop' as an 'Additional Use' on the corner lot..



The current zoning of the Goode Beach precinct, along with land use and servicing constraints has capped the future population of this locality, which is insufficient in number and catchment area to support an additional shop. Therefore, it is proposed to delete the additional use coding over the land, which will take away the shop designation and include a residential coding consistent with the surrounding area.

3.0 PLANNING

3.1 Town Planning Scheme No.3

The subject land's base zoning is currently 'Residential' with an Additional Use of 'Shop' and R 10 in the City of Albany's Town Planning Scheme No.3

3.2 Albany Regional Strategy

The 1994 Albany Regional Strategy defined Little Grove as a settlement and Goode Beach as a recreational node.

3.2 Local Rural Strategy

The Local Rural Strategy, as Amended in 2002, only allows for possible environmental protection zones in an area to the north of the subject land near Goode Beach. Such developments will be of a low density thus have little impact on the population growth to justify additional services, such as shop on the subject land.

3.4 Commercial / Retail Strategies

The 1994 Albany Regional Planning Study – Commercial Strategy for Albany did not define Part Lot 376 for any retail purposes or a centre. The nearest identified centre was at Little Grove and it was designated as a Local Centre in the Strategy.

Both the 1994 Albany Commercial Centre Strategy and the Albany 2000 Commercial Strategy Review identified Little Grove as the nearest retail centre.

The most recent *March 2004 Retail Development Strategy* prepared for the City of Albany and adopted by Council for referral and advertising reinforces the findings of previous studies by designating Little Grove as the Local Centre with no reference to an additional shop or retailing in Goode Beach.

3.5 Sewerage Policy

The proposal complies with Section 5.1 of the 'Draft Country Sewerage Policy' as it creates less than four additional lots that infill the existing housing development completing the existing subdivision pattern. As the average lot size for the 'Residential' Zone in this locality is approximately 800 m² the proposal for three large residential lots complies with the Policy's requirement in lot numbers as well as new lot sizes that are consistent with the existing subdivision pattern.

3.6 Liveable Neighbourhoods

Liveable Neighbourhoods 2004 sets the standard for local neighbourhood centres, including a retail component. These standards are based on a minimum Residential R 20 coding with a population catchment within a walking distance of 400-450 metres plus a public transport stop. With a residential density of R10/12.5 and no public transport to Goode Beach these standards do not apply to Goode Beach. The existing occasional daily needs of residents in Goode Beach are met by the nearby Frenchman Bay Tearooms that include a shop and the local centre at Little Grove.

3.7 Viability of a Local Shop

A valuation of the subject land was undertaken in mid-2000. The study concluded that there is a limited future for the land being used for local shopping because of the following:

- The existing general purpose store at Little Grove provides for local shopping as well as a petrol and liquor outlet. It is also easily accessible to passing traffic whereas the subject land is not on a major traffic route. Access and egress to the site for external traffic from Frenchman Bay Road is only from Vancouver Road;
- The limited population catchment of the Frenchman Bay area has seen little demand for a local shopping as most residents tend to shop in Albany as the regional centre or Little Grove for emergencies; and
- The elongated nature of the site is not suitable for the design and construction of local shopping facilities.

Currently there are a total of 220 residential, special residential and special rural lots in Goode Beach with a total population capacity of approximately 550 people. There is currently a population of approximately 360 persons. Due to land use, catchment and servicing constraints a population potential of 550 to 600 people would not be sufficient to economically sustain a local shop in Goode Beach.

3.8 Residential R 12.5

The 2002 Residential Design Codes general site requirements for an R 12.5 density are a minimum lot size of 700 m2 and an average of 800m2. As the proposed three residential lots will be over 800m2 they comply Design Codes. The proposed lots can also accommodate a single dwelling within the R12.5 code setback requirements

The City of Albany's *Our Place Our Future* also supports an R10/12.5 density at Goode Beach as well as the current *Draft Housing Strategy*.

3.9 Land Capability

The sites capability for development is based on The Commonwealth Scientific Investigation Research Organisation (CSIRO) land form/soil mapping units, (Churchwood & McArthur).

The subject land is within the Gs Unit. The land capability ratings indicate that the Gs Unit has high soil absorption ability and high capability for on site effluent disposal. It also rates the land quality as having good foundation soundness and fair capability for housing development.

It is concluded the soil, with normal compaction will provide a sound foundation for building construction and effluent disposal systems can be installed to ensure the appropriate level of water treatment is provided.

In August 2004 the Environmental Health section of the City of Albany undertook site testing on the subject land for three residential lots. The tests results found no signs of ground water nor movement of groundwater through the subject land and that based on the results all three proposed lots were suitable for on site effluent disposal.

3.10 Roads and Access

La Perouse Road is a 7.4 metre sealed and kerbed road, designed to cater for traffic accessing the Goode Beach locality from Vancouver Road and Frenchman Bay Road. Klem Road is a 4 metre sealed road and designed to accommodate local traffic. It is proposed that access to the subject land be from either La Perouse or Klem Roads. The increase in traffic generation from these lots can be accommodated by the local road system.

3.11 Services and Drainage

Reticulated water, power and telecommunications currently run past the subject land. There are no future plans to provide reticulated sewer to Goode Beach. The nearest locality for proposed sewer is Little Grove some 7 kilometres away. The site is currently served by adequate drainage. However, it would be anticipated that storm water run off from the subject land would be mainly contained on site.

3.12 Public Opinion

As a result of the advertising for comment on the previous Amendment No.228 in 1994 there was general local community support for the proposed 'Residential' zoning but not for the 'Additional Use' shop due to the lack of need, increased local traffic and amenity factors, such as additional noise, lighting and safety issues related to access to the site and the standard of local roads to support the additional traffic generated from the use.

Further to the City's consideration of the submissions a meeting of the Frenchman Bay Progress Association voted 16 to 1 against the proposed shop.

4.0 AMENDMENT PROPOSAL

The proposal for Part Lot 376, Klem and La Perouse Road, Goode Beach, involves rezoning the land to Residential and deleting the 'Additional Use' designation. It is also proposed to introduce a R12.5 density coding for this property into the Scheme.


This proposal will enable three large residential lots with an R 12.5 coding to be created consistent with existing lot sizes surrounding the subject land an in accordance with WAPC and the City of Albany strategies and policies.

The residential land has access to all necessary services apart from reticulated sewerage with no current plans to extend the sewer to Goode Beach.

Goode Beach residents have shopping facilities in Albany, Little Grove and a local shop at the nearby Frenchman Bay Tea Rooms. WAPC and the City of Albany commercial and retail strategies and policies support Little Grove as the local centre for the Goode Beach locality. It is clearly evident there is not a need for an additional shop on the subject land due to its lack of economic viability, due to existing retailing in the locality, a small local population catchment and being located some 1.5 kilometres away from major through roads.

5.0 CONCLUSION

This Amendment will modify the zoning of Part Lot 376 La Perouse Road, Goode Beach, to reflect the subject land's potential for housing through a 'Residential' R12.5 zoning consistent with adjoining lot sizes, and the deletion of the 'Additional Use' Shop due to the existing shop at the nearby Frenchman Bay Tea Rooms and the Little Grove Store. This proposal is also supported by the local residents and progress association.

The intent of the agreement is to document the process of the hand over and stand down arrangements to be followed should your Local Government request FESA to assume control of an incident. Handover of control of Bush Fires under Section 13.4 of the Bush Fires Act 1954

From Local Government to the Fire and Emergency Services Authority of Western Australia

SCOPE

It is FESA Fire Services intent to assist Local Government with the response to fire emergencies when requested, by the provision of expertise and support in Incident Management. To enable this to occur there must be a graduated structure of notification and response (triggers).

Responsibility for resourcing and responding to an emergency initially rests at the local level. An emergency beyond the capability of local resources will receive support from District resources. State resources will be provided if District resources are inadequate or likely to be exhausted.

It is imperative good communications exist between Local Government, District Offices and State Headquarters at all times, to ensure accurate intelligence and timely application of resources to manage the emergency.

PURPOSE

This document is designed to assist Local Government and bush fire brigades in making quality decisions during times of crisis. This document provides guidance in determining the appropriate actions to ensure effective incident management is achieved.

To provide support to Local Governments and Bush Fire Brigades, the Bush Fires Act 1954 was amended to enable a Local Government to request FESA under Section 13(4), to:

> Where a bush fire is burning in the district of a local government the Authority may, at the request of the local government, authorise a bush fire liaison officer to take control of all operations in relation to that fire. - 255

The intention of the Act amendment is to enable Local Governments to request FESA to take control when a bushfire escalates in complexity to a point where firefighting resources are stretched and assistance and support is required.

TRIGGER POINTS

Local Government is encouraged to continually assess fire development and behaviour and seek assistance from their FESA Fire Services District Office should the incident escalate.

It is critical that early notification of emergencies occurs to allow timely application of resources to manage the emergency

Trigger points are a guide to assist officers in assessing whether control of the fire should be handed over to FESA.

Key trigger points are listed below

- A major bushfire Level\Type 2/3
- Multiple incidents Level\Type 1/2/3
- Long duration incidents Level\Type 2/3
- Serious injury and/or fatality
- Community under threat
- Major Infrastructure threat\loss (life lines)

Duties and powers of bush fire liaison officers

13. Duties of bush fire liaison officers

This Operational Response Agreement, documents the formal handover process for transferring Incident Management from the Shire of to the Fire and Emergency Services Authority of Western Australia (FESA)

LEGAL COMPLIANCE

This Operational Response Agreement is made pursuant to the responsibilities described in the Local Government Act 1996, Fire Brigades Act 1942, FESA Act 1998 and <u>specifically the Bush Fires Act 1954 Section 13. (4)</u>

Where a bush fire is burning in the district of a local government the Authority may, at the request of the local government, authorise a bush fire liaison officer to take control of all operations in relation to that fire.

Section 13. (5) Of the Bush Fires Act 1954

If a bush fire liaison officer takes control of all operations in relation to a fire, all

bush fire control officers; and

officers and members of a bush fire brigade,

who are present at the fire are in all respects subject to, and are to act under, the bush fire liaison officer's orders and directions.

TRANSFERRING CONTROL

(a) Where an incident is considered by the Incident Controller or the Fire Services Manager to be a bushfire/s indicating that one or more of the agreed trigger points is present (see attachments), the nominated Local Government representative may request FESA, through

its nominated officer, to take control of that fire under Section 13(4) of the Bush Fires Act 1954.

(b) Local Governments nominated representative will be either the Chief Executive Officer, Chief Bush Fire Control Officer or Deputy Chief Bush Fire Control Officer.

FESA's nominated representative will be FESA Fire Service on call Executive Management Team member.

- (c) The handovers will be documented on the Emergency Incident Handover and Stand Down Proforma's. The FESA Communication Centre is to be advised on the day.
- (d) Financial Assistance will be provided as per WILDFIRE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE APPROVAL TO EXPEND SAP12
- (e) Where incident control has been handed to FESA, at least one (and preferably more) Senior Shire Bushfire Control Officer/s will, be a member of the IMT to provide local knowledge and facilitate effective liaison with local firefighting resources.
- (f) The Shire bush firefighting resources, including appliances and volunteers will remain at the incident and assist in suppression activities as determined by the Incident Controller.
- (g) This agreement shall remain until the Incident Controller/Manager determines the bush fire has been contained and stand down procedures can commence.
- (h) This protocol is to be reviewed by FESA and the Shire ofannually following the fire season.



Jon Berry reported that Council had resolved to establish the group as a Committee of Council under the Local Government Act and that its terms of reference are to 'lead integrated master planning of the Brig Amity and surrounding heritage precinct to improve visitor appeal'.

5.2 Proposed Master Plan for Amity Heritage Precinct

It was agreed that the first task of the Committee was to facilitate a master plan for the precinct and that this should identify issues, opportunities and guidelines for enhancement of the precinct. It would also consider integration of various plans and strategies of organisations with operations and/or land holdings in the precinct. (WA Museum, Albany Historical Society and City of Albany)

Members discussed their preliminary ideas on enhancement strategies including improved interpretation on the Brig Amity; displays on the 'Voyages of Discovery'; Settlement History; Pre-European history;

Members agreed that plans needed to be developed in a holistic environment with the activities of other organisations and initiatives such as the Duyfken Shed and adjacent Anzac Peace Park.

Rachael indicated the Museum has some strong expertise in interpretation that could be utilised in the master-planning phase. A draft policy for conservation prepared in 1992 was also referred as a source of information.


It was agreed that members should contribute their ideas for what they would like to see in the master plan brief and provide an overview of any plans that they have for their particular operations.




