

RE: PROPOSAL TO REZONE LOT 302 LOC 1462 NANARUP RD LOWER KALGAN

The Department of Environment (DoE) would not object to the proposal and provides the following advice.

The subject land is in close proximity to Oyster Harbour, which is currently suffering from eutrophication (nutrient enrichment) caused by surrounding land use. Without adequate measures to contain and manage nutrients on site, the proposal has a risk of nutrient export. Further information needs to be provided as part of the proposal on how nutrient export from the site will be effectively managed.

Effluent Disposal

Further details are required in relation to the proposed alternative treatment unit (ATU) and wastewater disposal. Management of effluent disposal and treatment should meet the DoE's minimum requirements for buffers from waterways. The proponent should demonstrate how the proposed system meets the DoE's requirements for both horizontal and vertical separation distances from surface water and groundwater.

The DoE recommends that approval to the proposal not be granted until such time that the proponent demonstrates that effluent disposal meets the DoE's recommended minimum requirements for separation from waterways. For ATUs that satisfy the Department of Health that they are capable of limiting phosphorus movement from the site, a horizontal separation of 50m to the highest known level of a waterbody shall apply, and a 0.9m separation from the highest known groundwater level or bedrock from the base of the leach drain.

Whilst use of amended solls may limit phosphorus loss from the site, the DoE is not satisfied that loss of nitrogen to the environment has been addressed. Without an effective disposal mechanism in place, the risk of nutrient export, in particular nitrogen, to Oyster Harbour is considered high.

Further details regarding the proposed method of wastewater disposal need to be provided. This should include information on how the proponent proposes to limit nitrogen loss. The proponent should demonstrate the site's capability for disposal in relation to surface irrigation or semi-inverted leach drains or slotted irrigation pipe or other means of treatment including treatment ponds. In relation to surface irrigation, details of the proposed disposal area and how nutrients will be contained and managed on site should be provided.

Any plan to use surface irrigation as a means of wastewater disposal should require preparation of a Nutrient and Irrigation Management Plan

The DoE advises that under category 85, Schedule 1 of the Environmental Protection Regulations 1987, the centralised alternative wastewater treatment unit is a prescribed premises and as such will require a works approval prior to construction and registration on completion. Stormwater Drainage

Management of stormwater drainage from the caravan park needs to be detailed as part of the proposal. Stormwater needs to be separated from natural drainage, which is to be directed into the drainage basin in the north-east corner of the site. Excess surface water will result in increased recharge of groundwater within the waste water disposal buffer area, raise groundwater levels and thus reduce the effectiveness of the wastewater disposal buffer area.

The discharge of stormwater into natural drainage systems prior to treatment is unacceptable. Where natural drainage paths are to be used, the DoE advises that, as a minimum requirement, infiltration of base flow and low intensity events should be maximised prior to any overflow into a natural drainage path.

Advice to Local Government Authority

The Department's Manual for Managing Stormwater Quality in Western Australia (WRC, 1998) and principles for Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD) are being revised. The principles of design have shifted to an emphasis on 'at source controls'. The revision of the Manual aims to facilitate delivery of some of the recommendations of the State Sustainability Strategy and State Water Conservation Strategy. The principles outlined in these State Strategies apply to stormwater management and should be adopted by all stormwater managers in an aim to achieve the targets and objectives set by the Strategies.

A Position Statement on the interim principles and objectives has been prepared by the Department and is attached.

Remnant Vegetation

The large area of remnant vegetation on the south-east corner of the site is shown on the Development Guide Plan as a hazard reduction area. The proponent should clearly define what measures are proposed for hazard reduction and is advised that under new Clearing Regulations (<u>Amendments to Environmental Protection Act 1986</u>) clearing of native vegetation will require a permit, unless for an exempt purpose. 1 Purpose

This Position Statement provides the interim principles and objectives for stormwater management while the *Manual for Managing Urban Stormwater Quality in Western Australia* (WRC, 1998) is being revised. The revised Manual will supersede the Position Statement and 1998 Manual. Institutional and financial arrangements for managing stormwater are being reviewed in parallel with the Manual revision.

The purpose of this Position Statement is to provide coordinated guidance to developers, environmental consultants, Local Government, the Water Corporation and State Government Departments on current best management practice principles relevant to urban stormwater management for new urban development in Western Australia. These principles are also applicable to redevelopment projects, however additional mechanisms are required to address stormwater management issues in existing developed areas.

The principles outlined in this Position Statement should be used in the preparation of structure plans, Town Planning Schemes/amendments, subdivision and development applications, while the new Manual is being prepared.

2 Strategic Context

There are a number of National and State strategies that provide the framework and principles for the development of Best Management Practice for stormwater management in Western Australia.

For 25 years Perth and the South West of Western Australia in particular have experienced significantly lower than average rainfall and run-off into storage dams. In response to the water resource constraints that exist in many areas of Western Australia, the State Government is developing an overall water strategy for the State and has released the *Draft State Water Conservation Strategy* (July 2002). The Draft Strategy aims to improve water use efficiency across all water use sectors throughout the State by delivering water, energy and overall savings to the Government and the community. The emphasis of the Strategy is the application of economic instruments to ensure optimal investment in water conservation. The barriers to the implementation of water efficiency options are often financial and institutional, and in some cases related to a lack of information (*Draft State Water Conservation Strategy, July 2002*). Accordingly, the Strategy aims to remove these barriers to investment in water efficiency options. The *Draft State Water Conservation Strategy* makes 38 recommendations on improving water efficiency in WA, including promotion of water sensitive urban design, use of water efficient fittings in all new developments / redevelopments and penalties for using sprinkler systems in the rain.

A vision of the Western Australian State Sustainability Strategy: 'Focus on the Future (Consultation Draft September 2002)' is that water is used with care and is provided sustainably to meet needs. The objectives of the Strategy include to reduce water consumption, achieve significant wastewater reuse and to extend responsibility for water supply to the planning system (water sensitive design) and to local government (Regional Councils) for groundwater supplies. The recommendations of the Sustainability Strategy include water wise gardens, greywater recycling, water efficient appliances, wastewater reuse, water sensitive urban design, rainwater tanks and bores in suitable areas.

The revision of the Manual for Managing Urban Stormwater aims to facilitate delivery of some of the recommendations of the State Sustainability Strategy and State Water Conservation Strategy. The principles outlined in these State Strategies apply to stormwater management and should be adopted by all stormwater managers in an aim to achieve the targets and objectives set by the Strategies.

3 Preamble

The Manual for Managing Urban Stormwater Quality in WA (WRC, 1998) is currently undergoing a major review to better address integrated urban stormwater management, and is targeted for staged release during 2003. Integrated stormwater management considers stormwater as an element of the total water cycle. Total water cycle management recognises that water supply, stormwater and sewage services are interrelated components of catchment systems, and therefore must be dealt with using an holistic water management approach. This approach better enables urban water to be seen as a resource and helps maximise opportunities for water efficiency, re-use and recycling. The revised Manual will continue to build on the philosophy of total catchment management and Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD), incorporating current best management practice, as suited to WA conditions. The Manual review is necessary due to:

- Experience and knowledge gained since the release of the 1998 Manual in respect to the systems implemented in WA and their maintenance requirements;
- Research findings by CSIRO and the Cooperative Research Centres for Catchment Hydrology and Freshwater Ecology;
- An increased urgency for stormwater managers to consider the health of aquatic ecosystems, including streams, rivers and wetlands;
- A paradigm shift to an emphasis on local infiltration systems and 'at-source' controls;
- A need for current information on: 'at source' controls; retrofitting to improve the effectiveness of existing drainage infrastructure and; guidelines on the monitoring of the performance of stormwater management systems.

This paper provides early advice as to changes being incorporated into the 1998 Manual, in respect to stormwater management principles and objectives. This paper should be read in conjunction with the 1998 Manual, and serves to supersede any inconsistent or contradictory content within the 1998 Manual.

4 Background

The creation of impervious surfaces in urban areas, particularly roads, has resulted in increased stormwater flow volumes. Conveyance of stormwater runoff, via extensive open drain and pipeline systems, directly into natural water bodies can result in the export of large amounts of nutrients and other pollutants and loss of local groundwater recharge, causing a deterioration in environmental quality and biodiversity characteristics of local and regional catchments.

The gradual increase in environmental awareness and standards demanded by the community over the last 10-20 years in WA, has seen the objective of 'water quality management' and 'water conservation' added to the original objective of 'flood prevention' for stormwater management

Consequently WSUD was developed in the late 1980s, principally to harmonise urbanisation with water resource management. Objectives of WSUD (CSIRO, 1999) are to:

Protect natural systems - protect and enhance natural water systems within urban developments.

Integrate stormwater treatment into the landscape - use stormwater in the landscape by incorporating multiple use corridors that maximise the visual and recreational amenity of developments.

Protect water quality - protect the quality of water draining from urban development.

Reduce run-off and peak flows - reduce peak flows from urban development by local detention measures and minimising impervious areas.

Add value while minimising development costs - minimise the drainage infrastructure cost of development.

The principles of WSUD have been adapted across Australia, with approaches varying between States in response to predominant conditions (eg. soil permeability and rainfall pattern).

The National Water Quality Management Strategy - Australian Urban Stormwater Management Guidelines (ARMCANZ, ANZECC 2000) has set out a stormwater management preference hierarchy as follows:

- 1. Retain and restore valuable ecosystems: retain or restore existing valuable elements of the stormwater system, such as natural channels, wetlands and riparian vegetation;
- 2. Source control: non structural measures: non-structural techniques (eg. education) for limiting changes to the quantity and quality of stormwater at the source;
- 3. Source control: structural measures: constructed management techniques installed at or near the source to manage stormwater quantity and quality;
- 4. In-system management measures: constructed management techniques installed within stormwater systems to manage stormwater quantity and quality before discharge into receiving waters. These are only proposed if there are residual impacts that cannot be cost-effectively mitigated by source or near-source controls.

The National Water Quality Management Strategy is supported in WA by the State Water Quality Management Strategy (May 2001).

6 Stormwater management principles in WA

The stormwater management hierarchy applied in WA is as follows:

- 1. Retain and restore natural drainage systems retain and restore existing valuable elements of the natural drainage system, including waterway, wetland and groundwater features and processes.
- 2.Implement non-structural source controls minimise pollutant inputs principally via planning, organisational and behavioural techniques, to minimise the amount of pollution entering the drainage system.
- 3. Minimise runoff infiltrate or reuse rainfall as high in the catchment as possible. Install structural controls at or near the source to minimise pollutant inputs and the volume of stormwater.
- 4.Use of 'in-system' management measures includes vegetative measures, such as swales and riparian zones, and structural quality improvement devices such as gross pollutant traps.

6.1 Retain and restore natural drainage systems

Retention and restoration of natural drainage features and treatment processes such as natural creek lines, streamside vegetation, wetlands and intertidal zones are at the top of the management hierarchy. Urban stormwater should be managed to be consistent with the protection of natural drainage and treatment processes and conservation of biodiversity and natural heritage values. The Commission's objectives for wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain (WRC, 2001) are for the preservation of Conservation Category wetlands, the management and restoration of Resource Enhancement wetlands, and the application of ecologically sustainable development in respect to Multiple Use wetlands. Conservation Category wetlands are considered to be the most valuable wetlands, as they have high natural values and support high levels of ecological attributes and functions.

An additional management objective of the Commission is protection of the ecological function of healthy waterways throughout WA (WRC, 2000). The *Environmental Protection (Swan and Canning Rivers) Policy* (EPA, 1998) provides for the protection of 'beneficial uses' of the Swan and Canning Rivers including the maintenance of ecological processes.

Specific principles applying to urban stormwater management design in WA are as follows:

- 1. Existing values of waterways, wetlands and associated vegetation should be protected from development impacts.
- 2. There will be no direct drainage into Conservation Category Wetlands and permanently inundated wetlands (lakes) protected under the *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy* (EPA, 1992). Stormwater management design shall maintain the wetland's natural water regime (including water quality, quantity and regime requirements).
- 3. Existing natural drainage lines (ie. urban ephemeral streams) should be integrated within public open space, or 'multiple use corridors'. Long term social, environmental and economic benefits can be achieved for multiple use corridors, through good planning and design (ARMCANZ, ANZECC 2000).
- 4. Conversion of existing drains into 'natural' meandering streams with flood storage accommodated along the streamline, should be undertaken. In this approach, infiltration and detention of the stormwater is maximised at base flow and low intensity rainfall events. During infrequent high rainfall events the water flow velocities are minimised and flood storage is maximised. There are a number of good examples of restored streamlines in Perth and the south-west of WA. For more information please refer to the *River Restoration Manual* (WRC, 2002).

6.2 Implement non-structural source controls

These measures are based on the principle of stormwater quality management at 'the source' to minimise the input of pollutants into the drainage system. At-source controls are implemented through land use planning, community education, and management/maintenance practices.

Non-structural source controls will be fully addressed in the revied Stormwater Management Manual. In the interim however the Australian Guidelines for Urban Stormwater Management (ARMCANZ, ANZECC 2000) provides further information in this regard.

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6.3 Minimise runoff

The principal means of minimising runoff is by infiltration of rainwater and capture of rainwater for reuse, as close to where it falls to the ground and as high in the catchment as possible. It may be desirable to vary the amount of stormwater infiltrated depending on the site conditions and potential use of stormwater. Natural levels of flow to receiving water bodies may be desirable, as long as the rate of delivery and water quality are not significantly different to natural levels.

By infiltrating runoff and slowing migration of rainwater into receiving natural water bodies, there is maximum opportunity for nutrients to be 'bound' to soil particles and to be 'taken up' by plants or treated by microbes in the groundwater aquifer. Under the philosophy that 'prevention is better than cure', infiltration strategies should be implemented in conjunction with non-structural source controls (see Section 5.2), in order to prevent pollution of groundwater by all potential pollutants including hydrocarbons, heavy metals and nutrients.

Structural controls can be installed at or near the source to minimise pollutant inputs and the volume of stormwater. Structural controls are constructed management techniques such as rainwater tanks, vegetated swales, bio-retention systems and water reuse systems.

The predominantly sandy and porous soils in WA's main urban areas, provides the opportunity to maximise local infiltration and groundwater recharge. Local infiltration measures include porous paving, non-kerbed roads, vegetated swales and buffer/filter strips, retention areas and detention areas. Further information on these measures are provided in Sections 2 and 3 of the *Manual for Managing Urban Stormwater Quality* (WRC, 1998).

'Treatment trains' combine a number of local infiltration measures in sequence, to improve performance or overcome site factors that may limit the effectiveness of single measures (eg. runoff from a non-kerbed road flowing into a vegetated swale, allowing infiltration and treatment, and any overflow eventually flowing to a natural drainage path). Treatment trains may be integrated with natural drainage lines within multiple use corridors (Section 5.1).

Traditionally, urbanisation has resulted in more frequent runoff events, which cause more frequent pollutant inputs to waterways and waterbodies. Greater runoff volumes also generate higher pollutant loadings (ARMCANZ, ANZECC 2000). Reducing runoff, particularly from frequent storm events, assists in reducing the pollutant loads in receiving waters. For example, infiltration of a 1 in 1 year ARI event in Perth is effectively capturing 99% of the average yearly runoff from the site.

Specific principles applying to urban drainage design are as follows:

- 1. Rainfall from a 1:1 year ARI event should be retained and infiltrated 'on-site', unless it can be clearly demonstrated that achievement of this objective is impractical due to the hydrologic conditions of the site. This technique also ensures capture of 'first flush' events.
- 2. Runoff from all impervious areas, ie. roads and buildings, should be directed to soakwells or other infiltration structures which are able to accommodate a 1:1 year ARI event prior to overflow.
- 3. Controls which incorporate vegetation are generally considered an effective water quality management measure. These should be used both as single management measures (cg. swales and filter strips) and as links between infiltration measures.
- 4. Large and infrequent storm events, such as 1:5 and 1:10 year ARI events, can be mitigated through the use of landscaped retention or detention areas, that may be integrated within public open space/linear multiple use corridors.

6.4 'In-system' management measures

Stormwater management systems dependent on 'end of pipe treatment' by the collection of runoff from large areas of land (eg. suburb) into large constructed basins (eg. infiltration, wet detention, retention basins and constructed wetland basins) should only be considered where reliance on local infiltration is not practicable due to local hydrological, soil or geological constraints. Smaller basins higher in the catchment or other techniques to achieve detention, including natural forms, may achieve more effective outcomes. The potential benefits of various techniques will vary from case to case.

Information on large scale collection measures are referred to in Sections 2 and 3 of the Manual for Managing Urban Stormwater Quality (WRC, 1998).

7 Planning for stormwater management




Figure 1: Best Management Practice of stormwater requires integration of a range of measures (ARMCANZ, ANZECC 2000)

Best practice stormwater management planning will involve a combination of approaches (as shown in Figure 1). The protection of stormwater quality will depend on the successful integration and coordination of actions across disciplines and the establishment of partnerships between Local and State Government, industry and the community.

The first priority in managing stormwater is to ensure stormwater management issues are considered in the land use planning process. Stormwater management need to be addressed at a strategic level, as early in the planning process as possible (eg. regional strategies, Local Planning Strategies). An Urban Water Management Strategy should be an essential part of the preparation of structure plans, Town Planning Schemes/amendments, subdivision and development applications (such as for large group housing developments). Urban Water Management Strategies are to be prepared in accordance with the principles and objectives outlined in this Position Statement and are to include a performance monitoring program to meet the requirements of the Water & Rivers Commission. Submission on Planning Scheme Amendment No. 234

Re: 2.0 BACKGROUND

i

Please note the following inaccuracy:

The Planning report states that in the area zoned special site only a caretaker's flat and one chalet are situated. The building labelled "residence" on Fig.3 appears to be used only for short term holiday accommodation. Therefore the area already has 6 holiday chalets rather than the 4 described in the introduction.

Re: 3.1 Regional Planning.

The rural regional strategy recommends the preferred land use of the area as tourism and rural retreats. We are not against tourism which is appropriate to the area, such as the existing development. However, it is difficult to imagine our property remaining a "rural retreat" with a 74 bay caravan park next door. We are concerned our property will be devalued by this very large development occurring.

Re: 3.2 Albany Local Rural Strategy

Size of the caravan park

Why has such a large caravan park been proposed? There are another five caravan parks close by, at the Kalgan River, Willowie, Lower King; as well as Happy Days and King River Palms at King River. It does not seem of benefit to the region or these existing businesses to have another caravan park so close by. The owner of the Kalgan River Caravan Park has also noted that they are often under occupied.

Permanent residents

Will the caravan park be able to have permanent residents? This does not seem to comply with the Regional Rural Strategy.

Re: Policy GP 37

Development requirement - minimise clearing and maximise vegetation.

During our time (6 years) living next door we have observed Mr Keays plant only around 20 trees, and several shrubs, as well as a small crop of rowed wildflowers. When holiday chalet no. 6 was placed onsite (a transportable home) in 2000, Mr Keays requested use of our ROW, which we agreed to. He crushed approximately 20 3- year old trees which we had planted as a windbreak, which he agreed to replace. We eventually replaced them ourselves in 2002 as he made no move to do so, and has not reimbursed us since.

Mr Keays has also commented to Gavin that part of the guidelines for developing Country Cottages was to plant trees but he thought this was unnecessary and had not done it.

Minimise bush fire risk

We perceive an increased fire risk with potentially 74 groups of people at a time who are probably uneducated re: fire. We experienced a devastating fire in the summer of 2000/2001, losing our garage, car and much of our bush. We were lucky enough to save our home, unlike our neighbours. We do not perceive the chalets as a risk, as people spend most of their time inside them. However, with a greatly increased number of people smoking outside and walking through the bush the risk seems significantly heightened. According to the proposal, peak occupation times will coincide with the most dangerous time of the year for bush fires, the height of summer.

Screen development in visually sensitive areas

Neighbouring properties, ours included, could be classed as rural retreats. Our view to Oyster Harbour would be compromised, with an expected drop in our property value as well as the beauty of the view.

Re: 4.2 Geotechnical factors

Drainage and Flood Risk

i.

The "drainage management basin" is currently a dam which does not appear to hold water – constructed from a porous mixture of laterite and clay (our dam has a similar problem). Water leaches into the creek on the North side of Nanarup Road via the road drains.

Wastewater disposal

The proposed wastewater disposal relies on revegetation with local shrubs. There is little evidence of revegetation over the past 6 years, despite Mr. Keays stating it was a condition for rezoning to special rural. What evidence do we have that the owners will comply with this condition in the future? If the wastewater disposal system relies on revegetation then we suggest permission should not be granted until the vegetation actually exists, and is mature enough to assist with the wastewater disposal.

Re:4.3 Environmental Issues

Landscape and visual impact

The Planning document states the most significant impact is from Nanarup Road. There would also be a very significant impact from Hunton Road. There is no mention of the neighbouring properties, ours included, that look straight onto the proposed caravan park. We all purchased our properties as "rural retreats", accepting the existing cottages as an appropriate tourist development, and having considered their visual impact.

It is stated "trees planted along Nanarup Road will hide the view of the Caravan Park". Not from our property. When will these trees be planted, and how long before they are an effective screen? Perhaps it would be appropriate for the trees to be planted and grown to maturity rather than trusting it will be done in the future?

"The colour and style of the buildings will be visually compatible with the area" Please note the last holiday residence placed on the property (labelled Caretakers flat) is a 1960's fibro pale blue house with a blue tile roof, which is most incompatible visually with the area.

Re: 4.5 Potential Land use conflicts

The property is not fenced on the eastern side. Chalet patrons already walk through adjoining rural properties, including ours. This is currently not a significant problem, but a large increase in numbers would make the problem worse. The proposal states "the rural zoned portion of the property will act as a buffer". There is no rural zone; the "buffer" to our east is the special site zone which currently has 2 chalets. Dogs are also an issue. Currently, most of the Country Cottages guests keep their dogs under control. However, we have had numerous occurrences of dogs coming over to our property and chasing our chickens, urinating on and around the house, barking at us and our small child etc. The numbers have been reasonably small; however a large increase in dogs is highly undesirable.

Re: 5.0 Services and Infrastructure Fire

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As previously stated, we are concerned about a large influx of people during the peak fire season with perhaps limited awareness of fire safety.

Re: 6.0 AMENDMENT PROPOSAL

6.1 Site suitability and justification

- "Tourism is an important component of Albany's economic development..." We agree, however six caravan parks within a relatively small area seems excessive, and not good for the existing businesses.
- "Surrounding land use is predominantly rural living which is considered compatible with the proposed expansion of tourist activity". We are next door and do not consider it compatible with us. Would you buy a "rural retreat" next to a 74 bay Caravan Park and 6 chalet complex?
- "Portion of the property has already been zoned and developed for holiday accommodation" Is it correct that the "Caretaker's cottage" is being used as a chalet?

• "The development will comply with all relevant standards when constructed" Our observation of the current site is that the aesthetics are not pleasing, the last chalet in particular is not visually compatible with the area and there has been minimal landscaping or revegetation carried out over the past 6 years.

• "It is located on Nanarup Road..."

Whilst this is described in terms of the benefits, there are also drawbacks. The development will lead to an increase in traffic, mostly people not familiar with local road use. There is no footpath on Nanarup Road; however it is used by pedestrians and school children. This is a particular issue on the bridge over the Kalgan River. Has this safety issue been considered?



re Policy of Government on Infant Health Centres.

The following points have been decided by Cabinet in connection with the above :-

1. Firstly, upon receipt of an application for assistance towards the establishment of an infant health centre inany district, the matter of the necessity for such a centre will be thoroughly investigated by the officers of the Health Department and, if warranted, the Minister will give his approval.

2. Financial assistance in connection with the erection for the buildings will be given following upon the approval of plans and estimates which must be submitted.

3. The building must be vested in the Government or local authority and must not be used for any purpose other than an infant health centre.

4. The Government will be responsible for the administration of the centre, will supply the Sister and pay her salary.

5. The local people concerned will be required to -

- (a) provide the land and the furniture;
- (b) maintain the building, furniture and grounds;
- (c) provide a motor car for the sister in charge where necessary;
- (d) make the necessary arrangements with the sister to meet the running costs of a motor car;
- (e) supply petty cash, stationery, stamps, etc.

4.1 Disability Services Directory - Carelink

Irene Smith from Commonwealth Carelink Centre discussed the services offered by Carelink to seniors, people with disability and their carers. She also discussed the availability of a directory of services applicable to people with a disability through the Carelink telephone line: - 1800 052 222.

Committee members raised a number of queries with Irene and expressed an interest in seeing the service marketed more widely and effectively.

4.2 Proposed Redevelopment of Albany Leisure & Aquatic Centre

Mark Weller, City of Albany Recreation Development Officer attended the meeting and discussed the proposed redevelopment of Albany Leisure & Aquatic Centre and in particular the provision of disabled friendly facilities. Marl outlined proposals to improve access to both wet and dry areas and to provide accessible ablution and change room facilities. Mark responded to questions from the Committee and undertook to consult with the Committee in relation to final design and construction plans.

4.3 Accessible Children's Playgrounds

Barb Green, The City of Albany Parks and Reserves Planning Officer attended the meeting to discuss the planning and development of children's playgrounds around the City and in particular the provision of accessible playground equipment. Barb explained the concept of two tiers of park, with a "Regional or Family Park" having a different level of facilities and amenities than a "Local Park". She explained the proposal to locate Regional/Family Parks strategically throughout the City, so that every resident lived within 1.5kms of a Regional Park. Smaller local parks would similarly be located throughout residential areas, however these would have fewer facilities. Barb indicated that facilities, equipment and infrastructure would where possible be accessible.

4.4 International Disability Awareness Day 2004

It was resolved at the last meeting to consider suitable ways of celebrating International Day of Disability in December 2004. Members are encouraged to put forward their ideas.

Jaime Wilson discussed a proposal to conduct a multi-discipline sports event for people with disability in Albany sometime early in 2005. She will report further at future meetings.

Other opportunities to raise awareness of disability issues were discussed including providing awareness training for the general public through the use of impairment aides and getting people to experience access problems by using a wheelchair themselves. Kathleen suggested that utilising a high profile person in that process would assist with raising the profile of such an event and should generate additional media interest. Extending the awareness training into schools, businesses and the community was also discussed. It was resolved to give the proposal further consideration at the next meeting.

4.5 Universal Lock and Key System

It was resolved at the last meeting to investigate further the Universal Lock and Key System, which allows people with a disability to access public toilets that would otherwise be locked after hours. Information relating to the system, which is also known as the Master Locksmith Access Key (MLAK) System is attached.

Following discussion it was resolved that Rob Shanhun would seek advice on the adaptability of the MLAK System to the public toilets used in and around Albany. This would be considered before a recommendation is made to Council.

6. General Business

6.1 Roads, Paths and Other Infrastructure Issues

Les Hewer, Manager City Works reported on various access issues in regard to the City's roads and paths network. Jaime Wilson indicated that a substantial number of streetlights in the CBD area were not working. Rob Shanhun undertook to raise this issue with the Asset Plans Coordinator, Steven Broad.

6.2 Self-Serve Fuel Stations

Jaime raised the issue of problems faced by people with a disability getting service at self-serve fuel stations. She indicated that with most be staffed by just one or two people, who were generally positioned indoors behind thickened glass, attracting the attention of service staff was often difficult. Given that such an issue would be industry wide it was resolved to refer the problem in writing to the Disability Service Commission and request the matter be dealt with on a Statewide/industry wide basis.



MLAK Frequently Asked Questions



What is the Master Locksmith Access Key (MLAK) Scheme?

The MLAK is a new and innovative Scheme that uses a universal lock and key to allow people with disabilities 24 hours a day access to public facilities, eg. accessible toilets.

Why should we install the Scheme?

Accessible facilities should be open during the day, but it is sometimes necessary to lock them after hours. The MLAK is designed to increase access to these facilities. The MLAK will reduce vandalism, keep facilities clean and at the same time overcome the obstacle of accessible toilets being locked. Easy access to toilets after hours is something that the general public often takes for granted. For people with a disability the issue is never that straightforward. Many people with a physical disability in particular find it difficult to locate an accessible public toilet that is open in the evening. The Scheme is therefore extremely important to enable people with a disability to go out in the evening.

How successful is the Scheme?

After a trial period with Pittwater Council in 1994-95 there are now over 90 facilities fitted with MLAK. In Britain, where a similar scheme exists, there are over 4000 accessible facilities fitted with a universal lock.

Where can we use the lock?

MLAK has been fitted to elevators at railway stations as well as to accessible toilets in Council and National Park facilities. Please remember to leave the facility open during business hours.

What do Councils or the owner of the facility need to do to participate in the Scheme?

• Contact their local Master Locksmith to confirm that he or she is participating in the Scheme. (The Master Locksmiths Association on 1800 810 698 has a list of all its members across Australia.)

- Purchase a lock from the Master Locksmith and have it installed.
- Display a sign informing people that the lock has been installed as part of the Master Locksmith Access Key (MLAK) system and telling people where they can obtain the key. The Master Locksmith has MLAK stickers available.
- Provide an alternative, internal lock to prevent someone entering from outside when the toilet is in use.
- Make MLAK keys available for loan in your local area, for overseas visitors and others.
- Inform SCIA on 02 9661 8855; 1800 819 775 that the lock has been installed. SCIA will place the location of the lock on a database. An updated list will be distributed regularly, and on request, to inform people where the locks are located across Australia.

How much does it cost to purchase/install a MLAK lock?

For a lock already fitted to a door the barrel can be exchanged for \$20 plus labour costs. The cost of a new lock depends on the type of lock fitted. For a Lockwood 930 series Lever Deadlatch the recommended retail price is \$150.

Can a Council or building owner be legally sued if a person with a disability is hurt making use of its facility fitted with a MLAK lock after hours?

Legal advice suggests that the MLAK system neither adds to nor detracts from an owner's responsibilities. Owners are obliged to maintain all their facilities in a safe condition. Facilities are locked after hours to reduce vandalism and hence maintain that safe condition. MLAK gives owners the opportunity to reduce vandalism but still provide access to facilities for people with disabilities.

People with a disability can purchase their own universal key from their local Master Locksmith for approximately \$10. Availability is restricted to people who have a mobility difficulty OR who have written authority from:

- a doctor,
- a disability organisation,
- a local council or community health centre, or
- the centre management or owner of a building with an accessible toilet on site.

Report for the AAAC – August 2004

Arts Project Officer

Exhibition / Gallery Curator: Annette Davies

Tuesday August 17, 7.30 pm, Special viewing of *Tranpositions* exhibition, with guest speaker Dr Nonja Peters, Director of the Migration, Ethnicity, Refugees and Citizenship Research Unit at Curtin University of Technology, Perth. Annette Davis will give an introductory floor talk. This event has been publicised on the Dutch Community radio program on Community Radio FM, Dr Peters will be interviewed on local ABC Radio, and flyers have been distributed to Dutch churches and throughout the community.

Lighting: A new lighting system is being researched, following the development of a major fault in one of the tracks in the existing system. Ian Jennings from NMA Lighting, Perth, has been contacted and will provide some recommendations and quotes. NMA Lighting has provided lighting systems for two galleries in Katanning, and is highly recommended by Bruce Gilbert, Shire of Katanning.

Hanging system: It is planned that a new hanging system will be installed on September 10 – 15.

Off the Wall Gallery (OTWG) Curator: Michael O'doherty

Future exhibitions:

- Megan Anderson to use the OTWG for SPRUNG to put 25metre long one sentence quote from her visiting writers. Confirmation of this will be in two weeks.
- Sandy O'Doherty has expressed an interest in putting up her grid drawings and paintings as a teaser to her show in Dec.

Marianne Jamieson has energetically used the OTWG to promote her workshops. Through this we have found the OTWG to be a very successful avenue for advertising. We are looking into using this highly visual space to do further advertising for the Vacs up and coming shows and workshops. A possibility of using 1 box for this is being investigated so not to conflict with the main use for the gallery.

<u>Unhiding</u> Co-ordintor: Melissa Butcher

Sculpture workshops: Michael O'doherty is organising the base structure of the sculpture in order for the participants to creatively attach mosaics. The class has been put on hold for a month and will resume in September.

Paiting wkshops: Currently in the second stage of workshops. They have commenced the creation of a banner to represent the Unhiding project. They are also creating paintings on canvas to add to their portfolio.

Photography: The photography workshops beginning with a workshop in 'photography painting mixed media'. The participants have produced some expressive and inventive results. We believe that this workshop was highly successful.

Unhiding has recently applied for the 'Community Services Award' submitting an application under the creating communities category.

Sprung Co-ordinator: Megan Anderson

The Sprung program has now been finalised and is in the process of being designed and printed. A few delays and program changes have held it up but expect it to be available by August 20. There are around 15 participating authors, visiting and local.

The registration fees have been changed this year for a more equitable access to all sessions and workshops. People can attend for as little as \$15 per day, or \$25 for the weekend, and workshops will attract an additional fee. The committee will meet more regularly in the countdown to the festival on September 17 to address the details.

VAC PAC School Holiday Program Co-ordinator: Tanja Colby

The July VAC PAC program was highly successful and we can now begin to focus on planning for October.

It is usual for us to break even at the end of the program, but this term we actually made a small profit of \$168.34. This occurred for several reasons:

- The donation of a class and all materials by the Just Us Embroidery Group;
- Tutors were encouraged to be creative in their use of materials and use, wherever possible, materials already at the VAC; and
- Tutors were encouraged to accommodate 2 more students per class.

These small things have made a positive difference and will continue to be incorporated into future programs.

The October program will take place between Monday 11th and Friday 15th October. During that week Vancouver Arts will be involved in the annual Artsouth WA Art and Craft Trail. The workshops will be slightly more public than usual, with the public encouraged to walk through the workshop spaces and view the children working. The popularity of VAC PAC continues to grow and we look forward to a fantastic October program.

Songlands

Co-ordinator: Teresa Hughes

Songlands is due to commence in Borden in October. Teresa Hughes has organised the event and has done a fantastic job. We are currently reviewing budgets and finalising the planing for the event.

Smokefree WA Concert Series

Musician Xavier Brown will perform the next Concert on Sunday 29th August 2004. Sue Cunningham a local musician will support Xavier. Both these artist will be playing original material. The concert is advertised as a gold coin donation and patrons will be able to BYO.

Bio for Xavier Brown:

Singer songwriter Xave Brown is an intimate solo musician with an extensive repertoire of his own material. Xave's lyrically driven acoustic performances are refreshingly honest and original. With a versatile and unique guitar technique and a gentle voice tinged with a sense of melancholy his tunes are wistful yet soothing.

Born just outside of Perth WA Xave has been playing music and writing songs from an early age. First learning piano then moving to bass Xave played in many local bands as a teenager including Brazen Sloth (bass and vocals). Brazen Sloth were runners up in the Albany - Bunbury Triple J Unearthed competition, played live to air several times on Triple J and appeared on ABC TV's music show Recovery.

Xave has also performed solo on Triple J (Merrick and Rosso) and supported The John Butler Trio and Carus Thomson as well as playing numerous gigs and festivals around the country <u>Healthway Program 2005</u>

Project 1 - Smokefree WA Concert Gallery Series

Residents that reside in the City of Albany look forward to the successful music concerts run at the Centre throughout the year. Currently we are running a collective musical mix of 7 concerts at the Centre and the audience numbers have increased with full houses at most concerts. We will continue in this tradition and offer top range local and imported acts in our intimate Gallery Venue.

We will be looking into working in collaboration with a Work for the Dole agency to implement a Music Events Management Work for the Dole Project.

Combining a training and employment program with this project at the Centre we can progress into new fields and broaden our scope. This will be achieved through offering opportunities for training and education into this area of the arts for unemployed people. A supervisor will be employed through Work for the Dole to monitor and train up to four participants working with the programme.

The Schedule of concerts will be as such:

- 5x local performances Sunday Afternoons, gold coin donation.
- 2x imported acts Saturday Evenings 8pm onwards

These concerts will run periodically throughout the year with a high focus on supporting up and coming artists within the area. There will be opportunities for new acts to come from the 'Recipe for Jam' project listed below.

Project 2 - Smokefree WA Residential - Recipe for Jam

Young musicians are eager to develop and nurture their musical abilities as our song writing workshops have proven. With high enquiries numbers and a booked class within a week we believe that music is an area that doors of new opportunity need to open for residents of Albany.

A six-day residential, held at the Centre, about music has been developed to lead on from this request from young people in Albany. The development and support for our young musicians will be created through a safe learning environment in which networking, self-esteem building and teamwork are highlighted. Learning from professional tutors young people try new music styles,

play in bands with others and perform on the final night. This performance will coincide with the Smokefree WA Concert Series.

The target group for the project will be young Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, with a high emphasis on reaching unemployed people aged between 18 –25. Participants must have a basic knowledge of guitar, bass, drums, keyboards or decks. Can be a beginner at vocals (including rap). Participants must be from Albany and surrounding communities. The cost of the programme will be free, though people will have to apply.

Healthway sponsorship will be linked to the Vancouver Arts Centre as the residential will be a Smokefree event and the Smokefree WA concert Series both take place within the Centre. This allows for outreach of the message to the participants within the residential and the patrons coming to the Smokefree WA Concert Series.

Project 3 - City of Albany Art Prize

The Albany Art Prize is one of the longest running events of its type in Western Australia. Running for over 41 years we have attracted entries from many of the State's best-known artists, many have since become some of our local treasures. Healthway sponsorship has allowed us to broaden the event by targeting specific groups that may not have known about the contest or who may need further support. As we are still looking at targeting these areas Healthway sponsorship is needed to assist us in supporting the two following categories; SmokeFree WA Award for Young Artists and the Smokefree WA Award for Aboriginal Artists. Past difficulties regarding Aboriginal entrance will be addressed with further discussions with relevant groups.

Tourist season is at its optimum in the Easter period, which has been a perfect vessel to promote the health message to a broader audience. Numbers are increasing each year with currently over 3000 visitors viewing the display.

Promotion of the event will consist of 2000 entry forms distributed through Western Australia and 3000 catalogues of entries, which are dispersed to all visitors to the exhibition. Extensive statewide advertising will also consist of other media vehicles such as radio, newsletters. We will continue the organised floor talks for schools, curatored the judge, as there has been an overwhelming appreciation from the students groups. TAFE have kindly offered their services again with the participation of their art students to assist with the co-ordination of the event. We also have a 100 strong list of volunteers that also will contribute. The promotions of the Healthway message will not conflict with any other sponsors as the City of Albany are the only other contributors towards the art prize. This makes the Art Prize the perfect vehicle for sponsorship.

Project 4 - VAC PAC

During the school holidays we have been successfully delivering innovative stimulating art programmes directed towards children. Many of these children have had a long history with the Centre and it would be a great opportunity to keep them involved.

This year we would like to expand the project to address this issue and reach further a field by meeting the creative needs of young people. The expansion of the VACPAC programme to include young people will bring a greater diversity of people actively using the Centre. The programmes will deliver a variety of mediums to engage the interest of participants.

Project 5 - Off The Wall Gallery

The Off The Wall Gallery (OTWG) is a community access art gallery located on the York St external wall of the Albany Plaza. The gallery is accessible to everybody but is strategically focused on schools, art groups and artists.

The Gallery comprises of 5 window boxes, each 1.5 x 5 metres. The Gallery is strategically placed in order to maximise the visibility for the gallery. Currently there is a walk by audience of 100,000 monthly.

The displays rotate on a monthly basis and are managed and curatored through the Vancouver Art Centre with a high emphasis on being non-commercial. There are quality control restrictions for selection of work for the Gallery to ensure suitability.

As the OTWG is highly visual, sponsorship for the Gallery is a perfect avenue to send a positive message about smoking and the effects to the broader community. Healthway logos and smoking messages will be located in the corner of each window box.

Project 6 - Sprung Writers Festival

The Sprung Writers Festival will celebrate its 6th year in 2005. Sprung is the only regional writers festival in WA, providing access for regional people (the Albany community and visitors from the wider region) to high profile published authors, allowing the exchange of skills and ideas.

The project reference group has been looking into avenues to develop the already successful project. The festival coordinator will attend the Byron Bay Writers Festival in 2004 with the view to researching ways to expand the festival and forge new links with national authors, publishers and other relevant bodies.

In 2005 the areas of development will be:

- Making the festival more assessable to readers by introducing more forums and panels conducted by authors. These forums will include Indigenous, youth and adult focused authors across a variety of themes.
- A continuation of the poetry and song writing stream of the Festival, with the possibility of taking workshops and discussions into neighboring regions in the lead up to the Festival.
- Encouraging young participants by developing youth-specific projects and promoting cross-pollination between Sprung and other VAC and community projects.

The project will be committed to ensuring a strong level of community involvement in the Festival, and fostering opportunities for Indigenous and Youth participation as part of a broad-based program.

Project 7 - Youth Art Magazine

Young people are a group that has not had a large representation at the Vancouver Arts Centre. By creating an opportunity for young people to be actively involved within the Centre we open up doors to ensure success in future projects. We have already approached a number of interested young people eager to begin the project.

A Youth focused and developed magazine is a fantastic avenue for us to target and assist young peoples needs through the medium of Art. The project provides young people with a voice in the community, instilling leadership amongst young people and allows them a vehicle to promote art in a variety of forms. The magazine will also have a high focus on Indigenous Australian culture. Young people will be mentored through the process of developing a magazine to ensure quality and a successful project.

The magazine will aim to publish 4 times a year in two versions, hard copy and via the Vancouver Art Centre Website. The magazine group will be made up of 6 - 8 members of young people ranging from 15- 25 years old. Contributions to the magazine from young people do not have an age limit to them. Themes in the magazine will focus on Art, Music, Environment and other areas that are of interest to young people Contributions from young people in the areas of poetry, stories, music reviews, pictures, bios, etc

As sole sponsors for the project this allows Healthway to promote the smoking message to a wider audience as the magazine will be a highlight on our website. Provision for smoking awareness education will be a large part of the magazine.

Project 8 - Digital Story telling

As this society is moving into the digital age, storytelling is now not only practiced orally through stories and songs. Discussions of collaboration with Channel 31 and the Centres Web Site this

innovative project, 'Digital Storytelling', could enhance the Sprung Writers festival. This will allow for stories from Albany to go to a global audience.

The participants will use storytelling techniques to put together their own 'mini – movie' to a specific captured theme. The workshops aim is to develop a story from experiences that the participants have brought in. The facilitator will be experienced in the appropriate media formats to produce the digital stories. No technology experience is necessary from the participants and we will look for diversity in people and stories

This project will give people the opportunity to air their stories on our website and through an established Television station. Free placements will be offered to young people over 18 years of age, that reside in Albany, to participate in a 6-day course – 48hrs in total. The participants will take their stories home with them in a video format at the end of the workshop. Their stories will also be placed onto our website and aired on a local television station. Sponsorship from Healthway will be noted on all exhibition formats and through out the workshops allowing the message of anti smoking to be reached globally.

Project 9 – Black and White

Using photography as a medium young Indigenous Australians will be trained in the art of black and white photography. This project is developed to empower Indigenous Australians with a voice by educating the community about the different aspects of their 'home' this could expand to encompass what they believe is home or their family lines etc

Consultation with the elders in the community will be included in the workshop structure, ensuring cultural appropriateness. The duration of the workshops will entail 2 four-hour sessions, twice a week for 6 weeks.

The photos will be placed together into a book and exhibited within the Centres Art Gallery. In order to motivate and inspire young people digital storytelling is an innovative avenue of self-expression. Aiding young people to tell a story about an important place, allows them to be committed to a topic of interest.

Project 10 – Albany Dog Show

The project will be in two parts. Part one will focus on practicing artists who will make dog sculptures to be exhibited in the Vancouver Arts Centre Gallery for 2 weeks then on to a "Roving Dog Pack" than can visit sites around Albany. Current interested parties include Plaza Shopping Centre, Dog Rock Shopping Centre and Gorepani Gallery. There is also possibility that we may use empty shop fronts in the CBD.

The exhibition would be mostly comprised of free standing Dog sculptures with the possibility of 2D and audio visual works based on the word "DOG". The objective is to put together a high quality exhibition that engages the general public with a commonly known and loved (or hated) motif.

The artist's job will be to use the word dog as a springboard to express themselves and communicate those ideas through the image or concept of "DOG".

Part two of the project will have a strong community focus. Community groups and schools will take part in a dog-making program to be run at the VAC. The participants will use clay to create sculptures to be exhibited in the "Off The Wall Gallery" a 24/7-access gallery on Albany Hwy. The exhibition will comprise of 60-80 sculptures. The project will run for a period of 8 weeks.

With strong association to the Vancouver Art Centre's two galleries the Healthway smoking message will reach a broad scope of people. Also as the exhibition will take place in extremely visual environments i.e. Dog Rock Shopping Centre, this further allows for outreach of the health message to a broad range of people.

Project 11 - Cultural Art Exchange

Designed to respond to the specific needs of Indigenous Art practice in the South West Region. The Noongar people that reside in Albany are not visual traditionally in the area of painting and drawing though their creativity lies in other areas such as carving.

The aim of the project is to empower Indigenous people with skills to meld their desire to engage in these visual art practices with the western Contemporary art form. Professional Indigenous Artists will be supported with direct employment as a link into this art program that will deliver arts experience to a cross section of the Indigenous community. For practitioners working with Indigenous people training will be provided in Culturally Aware Behavioural Management and Duty of Care (Legal and Cultural).

The program will be administered by a network of Artists that will:

- Engage in skills exchange
- Deliver mutual presentations
- Participate in professional development master classes
- Lead arts workshops
- Provide ongoing advice and direction

This project will also focus on partnership building to recognise the value of genuine partnerships in the Wider Community. Contributions from Healthway will assist with implementation of this culturally innovative project.

Final Report Albany Public Transport Taskforce August 2004

Purpose of the Report

To provide feedback to key stakeholders and taskforce members on the outcomes of the activities of the Albany Public Transport Taskforce (November to June 2004).

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Background

Access to transport as a Social determinant of health

The Albany Public Transport Taskforce formed in November 2003 following a public lecture titled *It Takes a Whole Town to Raise a Pedestrian* in Albany by 2003 Healthway visiting Fellow Professor Spencer Havlick. Taskforce members agreed to meet for a six-month period to develop recommendations by June 2004 to improve the current public bus service, which is in urgent need of review. Meetings were held fortnightly at the Health Department Grey St office in Albany. The Taskforce consulted with the Public Transport Authority (PTA), City of Albany (COA), Department of Planning and Infrastructure (DPI) and Loves Bus Service, the operator of the public bus service in Albany.

In Public Health there is an ever-increasing acceptance that health is determined not merely by behavioural, biological and genetic factors but also a range of economic, environmental and social determinants. Access to transport is a social determinant of health. Lack of access to public transport may affect access to employment, education, training, social support networks, and access to services. While much of the responsibility for addressing the social determinants of health rests with other agencies, public health has a role to play in leading and supporting intersectional and community actions to improve social determinants/pop health and wellbeing.

Murray Gomm (Alcohol and Tobacco Coordinator) and Trish Travers (Mental Health Promotion Coordinator) of the Great Southern Public Health Unit provided a lead role in the Taskforce by chairing, providing secretarial support, assisting with minute taking and providing the meeting venue.

- The large bus does not suit Albany's terrain and is unable to travel up some of Albany's hills
- The timetable is difficult to understand as the routes are not marked
- The service is not well promoted.

An unexpected outcome of the actions of the Taskforce is the review of the Albany public transport system by the PTA. This review commenced in June 2004 and will be completed by Feb 2005. The PTA are liaising very closely with the Taskforce to ensure that the issues raised by the Taskforce are addressed in the review.

5.3 Recommendations

5.3.1 Short term solutions

The parking limits within the central business district should be policed on a regular basis, allowing a reduction in the conflicts between customers and long-term parkers;

'n,

The creation of additional parking areas without timed-limits should be provided on the outskirt areas of the CBD, in order to attract long-term parkers away from the central areas;

An improvement in signage to direct people to available parking is needed to minimise the associated stress with parking,

Educate the public to reduce the expectation of parking in front of the store they wish to visit;

The promotion of alternative modes of transport. For example, encourage business employees to take part in major annual cycling or walking events, as this may inevitably encourage people to use alternative modes of transport more regularly; and

Advertise the route map of Albany's public transport system, which may include advertising on the internet, similar to the approach taken by the City of Boulder (see GO Boulder 2002)

5.3.2 Long term solutions

The current public transport system should be improved to adopt similar attributes of the private car, such as flexibility, comfort and reliability;

The current bus routes need to become more integrated with greater overlap within a five kilometre radius of the city centre, to ensure that residential areas are linked with trip attractors such as the CBD, (see GO Boulder 2002).

There is a need to create and improve cycling infrastructure in order to attract people to use alternative modes of transport. The infrastructure should aim to funnel people into the central business district from the surrounding suburbs; and

The central business district needs to become more pedestrianised, ensuring that an equal flow of pedestrians is achieved between the northern and southern ends of the CBD.

Points made

1.2 The high level of private car use being utilised by residents and employees to gain access to the central business district in Albany has the potential to negatively affect the economic and social vitality of the area

2.0 Potter & Skinner (2000) suggest that weak urban policies have contributed to an increase in mobility through a lack of restriction on private car use, exacerbating the problems of car dependency.

Even though vehicles have laid an important part in the economic development of cities they have also had their associated problems. Therefore challenging HamelŐs point of view that the increasing environmental costs associated with private vehicle use are now threatening the quality of life rather than enhancing it (Nijkamp et al. 1997).

2.2 Rosen (2001) suggests that public transport systems are often limited by transport policies, mainly because they are difficult to direct and the changes are hard to predict.

For example, the growth of traffic problems would encourage the expansion of the road network, thus encouraging more car owners to drive rather than to use alternative modes of transport, this creates further traffic problems, encouraging further expansion of the road systems, and so the process continues.

2.4 The private vehicle is particularly important for women with children, allowing them to perform many functions with ease such as multi-purpose trips, household errands and meeting the needs of children (Dowling 1999). For those women without a car, life becomes increasingly difficult

2.5 For example, alternative modes of transport should provide a level of satisfaction that agrees with the expectations and preferences of potential users (Nijkamp et al 1997).

Mackett (2001) recommends that the difference between the private vehicle and public transport should be resolved, by ensuring that public transport is more flexible, convenient and comfortable.

2.6 Finance for public transport systems in many parts of the world has become harder to obtain due to a decreasing proportion of public transport users. As a consequence, the level of accessibility, flexibility and comfort of public transport has decreased, creating the perception that car ownership and use is a necessity (Knight 1993).

2.7 According to Machett & Edwards (1998) and Cullinane (2002) the benefit of improving or creating a new system is very limited in scale and will at best have marginal effects.

The young, elderly and those without cars directly benefit from the services that public transport provides.

3.1 The Statistical Location Area (SLA) is approximately 34 square kilometres and contains 15,675 residents which is approximately 53% of the total population of the city giving a density of 456 people per square kilometre. The remaining area covering approx 4277 square kilometres has an approximate density of 3 people per square kilometre.

4.0 The first two aims of this research were to investigate parking and accessibility issues and to identify the modes of transport used by people to access Albany's CBD.

4.1 During the administration of the pedestrian survey many people commented that they had never used Albany's public transport system and do not intend to use it because it was seen as 'inconvenient' or 'irrelevant' to peoples everyday activity.

4.2.1 Pedestrian survey - 87.3% of respondents indicated that they were likely to use public transport at the same level they had in the previous 12 months. The remaining 12.7% were equally divided into those people who will use public transport more and those who will use it less.

The perception that the current public transport system cannot fulfil the same role as a private car has prevented its wide-scale appeal to the public.

This helps to support the view of Mackett (2001) who suggests that the public transport system should adopt characteristics similar to the private car in order to attract higher levels of patronage.

4.2.2 Investigations into the effectiveness of public transport revealed that 84.7% of the sampled pedestrians were of the belief that the current transport system could not fulfil the same role as the private car.

4.2.3 The underlying problem (in the CBD) is that a large majority of employees that live a few kilometres from the CBD use private transport to get to work.

72% of employees (in Albany) living within one kilometre of their workplace, drive to work.

Fig 4.9 reveals that almost the entire population of CBD employees travel to their workplace by car (95.3%) which is 4.9% higher than the 2001 ABS census figures.

The greatest barrier in encouraging people to use alternative modes of transport is changing their current travel behaviour (Coleman 2000)..... This is especially true in Albany where very little incentive exists to encourage a switch in the mode of transport.

4.2.4 The pedestrian survey revealed that a high proportion (over 62%) believed that there is a parking and accessibility issue in Albany's CBD

Over 81% of business owners or managers indicated that there is a parking and accessibility issue in Albany's CBD.

4.2.5 Therefore the car is more dominant in the middle-aged group, with 90-100% of people using the private car to get to the workplace.

It is vital that the area within five kilometres of the city remain accessible to ensure that the mobility and accessibility of people aged 65 years and above is not hindered.

4.3.1 Fig 4.17 suggests that 34% of car drivers and 15% of car passengers would switch their mode of transport to walking or cycling if the facilities were to be upgraded, therefore a total of 97 car bays would be available per day for other users.

---- employees living within 5 km of their workplace were more susceptible to change than those living further away.

4.4 Conclusion

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The greater the distance from the destination the greater the probability that the trip will be made by the private car

There is a large proportion of people using the car for very short journeys, where alternative modes of transport are expected to be used.

This study indicates that the current public transport system in Albany has failed to attract a significant proportion of people thus failing to resolve the problems associated with car dependency.

This situation (mobility and accessibility problems in the CBD) may encourage these people to reject the CBD in favour of other destinations, creating major socioeconomic problems for the city centre

5.1.2 A high proportion of the pedestrian population indicated that they preferred to shop in peripheral locations due to the problems associated with the CBD, such as parking and accessibility.

However the improvement of cycling and walking facilities was observed to attract a greater proportion of employees, than public transport. Indeed it seems that people are willing to switch modes of transport, but lack incentive to do so.

An unexpected but welcome outcome from the activities of the Taskforce was the announcement by the Minister for Planning and Infrastructure of a review of the Albany public transport system commencing July 2004.

These lots are zoned Special Residential and the extension of the GRV rating area will bring them into line with other adjacent lots, which are currently being rated GRV.



Attached is the Annual Report for the Great Southern Regional Council for 2003/2004 financial year.

Statutory Implications

Under Section 7.9 of the Local Government Act 1995, the Annual Report of a Council needs to be submitted for audit by 31 December following the year to which the report relates. This was done and the audit report was received on 28 July 2004.

Under Section 5.27 of the Local Government Act 1995, a Local Government must conduct a General Meeting of Electors after the acceptance of the Annual Report. However, Section 3.67 (3)(c) states that this requirement does not apply to Regional Local Governments.

Financial Implications

As a result of the audit, after meeting all expenses and payments, \$65,521.46 remains available for dispersal to member Councils. Under Clause 9.4 of the Establishment Agreement of the Great Southern Regional Councils, any surplus shall be divided amongst the participants in equal shares. This means that once the Annual Report is adopted, I will forward a cheque of \$13,104.29 to each member Council.

Comments

I believe the Annual Report fairly states the operations of the Great Southern Regional Council for 2003/2004 year and the audit report does not highlight any issues.

Once this agenda has been dealt with, a number of minor issues remain to be dealt with before the Regional Council is finally closed. These issues are: the payment of the final meeting fee for Regional Councillors, preparation of the Minute Book and sorting out of records (both paper based and electronic). I intend to forward these records to the Shire of Plantagenet, as Regional Council has asked them to form a Management Committee to oversee the Great Southern Regional Refuse Site in the future and these records will be useful for that Committee.
