# LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM UPDATE

Bulletin #05, September 2010

## Implementation Committee Update

The Local Government Reform Implementation Committee has made significant progress in recent weeks in driving reform of the sector. In addition to progressing structural reform, it is also considering a number of resources to assist local governments pursuing reform and the broader sector including:

- Human Resources and Change Management Plan The plan is a strategy document to assist local governments address change management issues while undertaking reform. These include maintaining the morale of local government staff and managing the impacts of uncertainty and change. Feedback from a selection of local governments that were asked to review the plan is being incorporated before it is produced for the broader sector.
- Integrated Strategic Planning Guidelines and Framework The draft Guidelines and Framework have been prepared for endorsement by the Committee. The Guidelines are intended to assist local governments to prepare strategic systems with accountable and measurable linkages between community aspiration, financial capacity and service delivery. The guidelines will also assist in developing practical financial planning systems and effective asset management systems. Once endorsed by the Committee, it's expected that the Guidelines and Framework will then go out to the sector for consultation and feedback.

Members of each of the Implementation Committee's Working Groups came together on 2 September to share information, discuss synergies and identify overlaps in their activities. Outcomes from the meeting will be referred to the Implementation Committee's next meeting and it's expected that the groups will meet again in the near future to discuss common issues and progress.

Improving local governments' approach to asset management has been identified as an important part of the reform program. With this in mind, a sixth working group has been established to assist in the development of greater asset management capacity including an asset management policy framework, asset management model and a set of guidelines for use by local governments. Membership and terms of reference for the Asset Management Working Group are to be confirmed at the Implementation Committee's next meeting.

The Local Government Reform Steering Committee Report is still under consideration by the State Government but expected to be made publically available soon.

## Gascoyne and Kimberley local governments seize opportunity for reform

Local governments in the Gascoyne and Kimberley regions have embraced the opportunity to reform by forming two Regional Collaborative Groups.

The groups comprise of the Shires of Carnarvon, Exmouth and Shark Bay in the Gascoyne region, and the Shires of Broome, Derby-West Kimberley, Halls Creek and Wyndham-East Kimberley in the Kimberley region.

Under the agreements, the groups will investigate the costs and the mutual benefits of a common service management systems.

There are now three Regional Collaborative Groups established under the reform program. In June, the Shires of Ashburton, East Pilbara, Port Hedland, and Roebourne resolved to form a Regional Collaborative Group. The Shires of the Upper Gascoyne and Murchison were also invited to form a Regional Collaborative Group and are expected to sign an agreement in the coming weeks.

Other reform agreements executed involve the following 12 local governments that have formed Regional Transition Groups:

- 1. Beverley, Cunderdin, Quairading, Tammin and York
- 2. Brookton and Pingelly
- 3. Mount Marshall, Koorda and Trayning
- 4. Subiaco and Nedlands.

Eight local governments are pursing amalgamations to form three new entities including:

- 1. Geraldton-Greenough and Mullewa
- 2. Morawa, Perenjori, Three Springs and Mingenew
- 3. Westonia and Yilgarn.

The Shires of Carnamah and Coorow are also in advanced stage discussions regarding a potential amalgamation.

These local governments have recognised the opportunities that reform can deliver to their operations and their communities. The benefits such as improved service delivery, more efficient systems and better use of resources will become increasingly evident as this process advances. Local governments that are not yet participating in the process are encouraged to continue to consider the reform options available to them.

## A New Zealand Perspective of Local Government Reform

Local government reform is not limited to WA, it's happening across Australia and abroad. One example is in Auckland, New Zealand where on 1 November 2010, seven local governments will amalgamate to form a new single unitary authority.

The Auckland Council will be Australasia's largest local government and represent 1.4 million residents. The Brisbane City Council is presently the largest council in Australasia with 1.1 million residents.

The Auckland 'Super City' was proposed by the Royal Commission on Auckland Governance which was formed to undertake a review of the existing structure following growing concerns about the workability of local government arrangements in Auckland.

It proposed a two-tier governance structure for Auckland Council: a governing body made up of the Mayor and 20 councillors, and 20 to 30 local boards. The governing body of the Council and the local boards will sit alongside each other and have distinct roles, rather than operate in a hierarchical relationship.

The Commission's recommendations are aimed at achieving significant streamlining in Auckland's local government and are intended to simplify roles, clarify mandates, improve efficiency and eliminate unnecessary duplication. #### 5.3 Proposal for Domestic Cat Control Legislation (05-022-01-0002 TL)

#### **MOTION**

That the Department of Local Government be advised that the introduction of cat control legislation is supported on condition that:

- 1. The cost to Local Governments to implement and administer the proposed legislation is minimised by:
  - a. the State Government training rangers and authorised officers and providing funding for the acquisition of specialised cat control equipment; and
  - b. the State Government fully funding any public education and awareness campaign.
- 2. The Department of Local Government form a working partnership with WALGA during the drafting process of the legislation to ensure:
  - a. the legislation is as simple as possible to administer and enforce;
  - sufficient notice is given before the enactment of proposed legislation to allow Local Governments time to budget and prepare for cat control legislation and to update infrastructure, equipment and procedures; and





- APWA technical committees where the American Association managed its own management and administrative processes through their committee structures.
- Special events, where special attention is given to:
  - First time attendees
  - International attendees
  - Young professionals (U35) network
  - Progressive women in public works
  - · Awards and recognition ceremonies

- Plenary sessions where guests key note speakers addressed he delegates on a range of subjects
- Technical sessions which were run in parallel, usually 12 sessions in parallel.
   Attendees could elect to attend any of these sessions
- WASTECOM The APWA congress was held in parallel to the North America Solid Waste Association annual congress, and the general facilities, access and exhibition halls were shared.
- EXPO This exhibition covered the full range of services offered by the private sector to local government, including consulting engineering, mechanical equipment and specialist proprietary services and equipment.

### **CONGRESS CONCLUSION**

It was a common experience among the attendees that some technical sessions were rather bland and did not fulfil expectations, while others really brought insight and understanding to the subject matter.

From my experiences, the management and leadership sessions were really insightful and provided reinforcement and motivation to adjust focus more towards a leadership and strategic emphasis, and less to the operational elements

These technical sessions also reinforced that the Australian practices are generally in good order and in some areas leading others – particularly in asset management, environmental management and water use management.

### **GOVERNMENTAL STRUCTURES**

Both the USA and UK have a 4 tiered government structure

USA	UK
Federal	National
State	District (being abolished)
County	County
Local	Local

In both cases the County is responsible for functions delivered in areas covering a number of local councils. These broader functions usually cover services such as

- Transport
- Regional Roads
- Waste Management
- Education
- Emergency (Fire, Police, Ambulance)
- · Community Health

In general, local councils are charged with the delivery of primary services such as

- Roads
- Local traffic management
- Parks, open spaces
- Parks, cycle ways
- · Community services
- · Town Planning services
- Building survey

In many cases, agencies have been created to deliver services as a (state owned) business unit for services such as

- Water Services (storm water, potable water, sewerage treatment)
- Highway Planning and Construction
- Public Transport
- Education

In summary on structure, there is a remarkable correlation between the governmental structure of the cities visited and those in Australia, with local differences to suit local circumstances. All tour members were quick to grasp the similarities and able to understand the workings of each council visited.

### **FUNDING**

The UK enjoys a funding protocol very similar to that of Australia, based on property taxes. This allows for a steady predictable income which is usually adequate to cover all operational cost components.

Larger projects are usually funded through regional of national grant sources.

During the GFC, most grant services were severely reduced to the point where budgets of local authorities have been reduced by up to 25%. This has translated to large staff reductions of a similar order. This has had a large impact to their capacity to deliver services, and many services have been either reduced of entirely cut.

In the USA, the primary source of funding for Local Government is Sales Tax. Property taxes are directed mainly to EMS and Education.

With the GFC, retail sales have dropped significantly, with a consequent reduction in sales tax and Local Government income. There are at this stage no alternate mechanisms available to replace this income loss. Any major project of funding stream requiring a loan is almost always put out to a public referendum, and the public then "votes" on the project proposal, and the funding thereof. This loan (or bond issue) would then be funded by an addition to the sales tax rate applicable in that Local Government area for a specific time period.

Also of interest is that some Local Government's have huge income streams due to the location of multinational corporate HO's in their areas, and from where web sales are conducted – with resultant sales tax revenues of large proportion. This has in many cases resulted in two adjoining local authorities have hugely diverse income streams and associated differing ability to deliver services to those communities. This means of income generation has also resulted in huge competition for development of retail businesses, particularly shopping centres, due to the high sales tax generated by such centres. This has of course some negative consequences in terms of town planning concessions made to such developers.

Overall this situation was experienced by council officials as an uncertain financial environment in which to manage the local government service delivery demands.

### A MOVE TO "SOFTER" SERVICES

A definite and deliberate shift towards a range of softer services is evident in the council visited. These services range from:-


- Advice on waste reduction
- How to save costs in running a household
- How employers can encourage cycling to work
- How employees can overcome obstacles related to cycling to work
- Availability of disabled facilities
- Traffic speed reduction and traffic calming (exclude speed humps)
- Advice on travel planning
- Energy reduction
- Recycling / reuse drive
- Procurement simplification
- School travel advice
- Customer interface improvement

### **ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT**



There are two major emergent streams in environmental management in some the UK and USA

### Stormwater Management



A major focus in American Local Government is the removal of nutrients from surface water, particularly nitrates and phosphates. This is done through a combination of education, legislation, enforcement and physical treatment.

Great demands are placed on new developments with respect to the management of storm water, the retention of natural facilities, contamination treatments on site and preservation of natural spaces.

### Solid Waste Management (SWM)

In almost all instances of the councils visited, SWM has been outsourced to specialised private companies. These companies deal with the full cycle of waste management from collection to recycling to landfill.

The Local Government however in most cities has the responsibility of collecting the income (usually part of the sales tax (USA) or property rates (UK)), and communicating with residents regarding amendments to collection mechanisms and schedules.

An interesting observation is that in the USA, almost all collection is manual, as opposed to mechanical collection in Australia. The opposite however applies to recycling, where modern technology has been employed to separate water and the various recyclable materials, and to increase the proportion of waste recovered for reuse.



### Storm Water and Sewerage

It is of interest to note that although not part of the goals of the study tour, most USA and UK older cities have combined stormwater and sewerage systems resulting in extreme variances in treatment volume demands. Large temporary storage facilities are often provided, with the 18 billion gallon facilities in Chicago being an extreme example. Treatment capacity at the Chicago facility is over 1 billion gallon per day.

Prior to this storage capacity being recently developed, the mixed sewerage and stormwater was discharged directly into Lake Michigan during high intensity rain periods. Currently all treated effluent is diverted through to the Mississippi River catchment and in to the ocean at St Louis on the Gulf of Mexico.

### **LEADING BY EXAMPLE**

Many councils are introducing the "green" movement and whilst encouraged by national legislation, are converting to green transport, lower carbon footprint buildings and similar initiatives to lead by example. Some of the striking aspects of the cities visited was their willingness to go beyond the traditional services provision and to embrace characteristics which assist to make their cities unique. Below are some examples of such aspects

### Public Art

One of the most striking aspects of the USA cities visited is their provision of public art, much of it abstract art with no logical connection to the City in where it is located some examples.



These works of art create a sense of excitement and interest to both locals and visitors.










### Celebration

All the cities visited had occasion to celebrate – themselves, as well as their history and contribution to their nation. In almost all cases, these celebrations were in the form of monuments, buildings or structures.

Clearly cities like London and Washington being national capital cities have their government buildings as national symbols, but Baltimore celebrates their history and role in the past in establishing their nation.

Newer developments like the Shard building in London to be the tallest building in Western Europe when completed in 2012, continue with the process of the establishment of national landmarks.

Whilst in the UK (and most of Europe) these historically significant buildings and symbols are included and sometimes hidden in the urban environment, more modern cities like Washington USA have provided their symbols in a park like setting with easy and visible access to all.

### Parks and Open Spaces

All the cities visited provided large central parks (green lungs) and had very few small formal neighbourhood parks. These were in general very well maintained and very easily accessible. Maps and interpretive boards were provided as necessary, mostly in the larger parks.



### SOME ALTERNATE OBSERVATIONS

### **Development Contributions**

It was a consistent throughout, that major infrastructure improvements were largely funded through development contributions.

In particular the provision of road improvements, public transport facilities, parks and open spaces as well as community involvement projects.

These contribution schemes were mostly developed in the public realm, advertised widely and transparent for all developments and investors to use as an input to feasibility studies on projects in the Local Government area.

### **Master Planning**

Virtually all long term decisions, at a financial, process or infrastructural level, have as a basis thorough long term plans. These council approved plans form the basis for consideration of budgets, project implementation and other long term decisions.

The plans vary in scale from the USD400 million for water and sewerage treatment works in Chicago, to UK£400 million for major arterial road construction to \$20,000 for cycle care implementation.

It was a common theme throughout the more established councils, that master planning and plan ready projects were available at short notice, and were ready for the application of funding streams.

### **Social Engineering**

Such a study tour would if necessary include a limited amount of socialisation, with most evenings spent at dinner as a group. As a group we got to understand each other, the respective backgrounds of each member, and how each member related to their work environment, their local authority and their social situation.

The group was invited out on a number of occasions and were exposed to the famous Chicago pizza pie and had a taste of a professional baseball game. Unfortunately both were culturally too different from the group references, and not enjoyed by any of the group.

At the congress however, the Chicago Chapter of APWA and the group became good friends and many an evening was spent socialising and exchanging fishing stories.

### **CONCLUSIONS**

The study tour exposed the tour party to a wide range of experiences, and a number of lessons were learned, as well as a number of opinions reinforced. The exposure furthermore provided a great deal of confidence in that the current practices with local government in Australia are shown to be at least as good as other developed countries, and we need not stand back, and in fact lead the industry in many fields.

- 1. Australia is performing well in forms of the technical aspects of engineering in Local Government.
- 2. Master planning of infrastructure could be improved to cover all engineering services
- 3. A more comprehensive state consistent development contribution scheme should be developed (Perhaps a IPWEA initiative)
- 4. Environmental aspects will become more relevant and council should take note and prepare for the shift of focus.
- 5. Solid Waste is more adequately managed by private specialist firms, and council can take the full step towards allowing this process to proceed to its natural conclusion as a service provided through the private sector..
- 6. The inclusion of modern technology for continuation with local communities could be explored towards the improvement of service delivery to communities.
- 7. Local communities should celebrate their uniqueness through public art, parks and other symbols

### **New Focus for Tourism WA**

The Board of Tourism Western Australia (Tourism WA) has implemented a new strategic direction and a revised business model to drive stronger tourism outcomes for the State. Further information can be viewed on the homepage of the Tourism WA corporate website www.tourism.wa.gov.au.

The new Infrastructure and Investment Division will focus on the development of strategic tourism infrastructure throughout WA. This means that Tourism WA will be withdrawing from its traditional involvement in smaller industry development and general tourism planning activities at a regional and local level. There will be a significant reduction in the number of staff as Tourism WA commences closing down its regional offices over the next few months. During this transition period all existing commitments will be honoured, however, there will be a progressive devolvement from committees and other working groups which do not have a Statewide focus.

Tourism WA's planning referral function has been transitioned to the Department for Planning and a separate communication to this effect has been sent to key Local Government operational staff. Tourism WA will continue to be involved in the planning and development of major and strategic tourism projects through the Landbank and Naturebank initiatives, particularly government land development projects or tourist accommodation proposals considered of regional or state significance.

A revised process to transition the tourism signage assessment process is currently being discussed with Main Roads WA and you will be advised of the outcome over the next few months. Staff from Tourism WA's Aboriginal Tourism Development unit have recently been transferred to the Small Business Development Commission's Aboriginal Business Services where they will be continuing delivery of Aboriginal tourism operator support programs.

Discussions with other key agencies are currently underway to transfer other functions that were previously performed by the regional offices. Advice will be forthcoming as these functions are successfully absorbed.

### Dear John

Recently you would have received a letter from Fitz Gerald Strategies (Mike Fitz Gerald is an ex-employee of WALGA and now working as a consultant in the sector) advising you of the outcome of a meeting that they organized for interested country shires to discuss the 'perceived lack of representation of country Shires in respect of issues relevant to rural local government and the possibility of forming an association representing rural interests'. The meeting was held on 4<sup>th</sup> August during the Local Government Convention.

I have decided to write to you to clarify some of the misinformation that was contained within the minutes taken of that meeting. This was not necessarily generated by Mr Fitz Gerald, however, some of the views expressed by people at that meeting may not accurately reflect the facts.

One of the more interesting observations around this meeting is that while there were 22 Councils represented less than a handful of people provided the comments that were contained in the minutes.

I would like to draw to your attention that no one has contacted the CEO or myself indicating specifically what concerns they may have, or where WALGA has not provided country Local Governments with representation and support. Additionally, I have seen no substantiation to support the claims that WALGA does not have the capacity to understand country issues or that the 'bush is underrepresented'.

Of course I do appreciate why some Councils may be feeling anxious at the moment when there is such a strong push for reform. You will have heard me encouraging Councils to face these challenges and to look at ways that reform can benefit them. Reform in this sense is about doing things differently; improving systems and processes and looking at ways to share resources; improving the way we do things, and amalgamations where it makes sense. I have not supported 'forced amalgamations' nor amalgamations that simply don't make sense. However, as a sector we do need to demonstrate that we have the wherewithal to deal with this crisis of sustainability, and of course reform applies to all Local Governments, not just those in rural areas.

### Issues from the Fitz Gerald Meeting and WALGA response

WALGA does not have a country focus and does not have the capacity to understand country issues

WALGA has a Local Government focus. The diverse background of State Councillors, executive and staff reflects the diverse nature of the Local Government sector.

There are significant issues with country representation.

The Association has a long list of issues that demonstrate strong country representation eg – responding to the GP crisis in the country and arranging a GP Health Forum; responding to the closure of Country Police Stations and arranging for a deputation of Presidents/Councillors to meet with the Commissioner of Police; responding to and working with Councils who provide services to Indigenous Communities etc.

WALGA people have no concept of how country Shires work and do not understand the issues of distance.

The past President and current Deputy President have a country background. Senior staff within the organization have worked in country Councils. The CEO has represented country Local Government for more than 10 years and has a deep appreciation of the difficulties that rural Shires face.

### Country Shires are not being heard

This is actually a criticism of the State Councillors. In reality this is suggesting that the State Councillors can't argue their case. It is the Zone that determines who represents them as their delegate – not WALGA. There has never been a time in State Council where country votes were not supported by metropolitan councils.

### WALGA needs to be audited as to its effectiveness

It's difficult to audit for effectiveness – perhaps WALGA could provide a list of achievements ecross its policy units and its business units each year. These could be assessed against metropolitan interests and country interests.

### Lack of information in the annual financial statements

What specific information are members seeking?

### WALGA does not understand the impact of one-vote-one-value

At the end of the day it's about resources and service provision in the regions regardless of the voting system.

I would like to provide you with an update on the proposed transmission line project from the Muja power station to the proposed Southdown Magnetite mine owned by the Southdown Joint Venture (70% Grange Resources Ltd, 30% Sojitz Corporation).

In 2005, the Southdown Joint Venture approached Western Power with a request for the supply of electricity for a new magnetite mine at Wellstead, located 90km north east of Albany.

After assessing a number of supply options, Western Power determined at that time that the most suitable option would be to construct a 300km 220,000 volt (220kV) transmission line from the Muja power station near Collie to connect to a new substation at the proposed Southdown magnetite mine in Wellstead. After extensive consultation with landowners and stakeholders a proposed line route was identified and announced in October 2007. Please see the attached map for the proposed line route.

At that stage, the Southdown Joint Venture expected the mine to be approved by June 2009 however there were a number of influencing factors that caused significant delays in progressing the project. These included:

- unexpected delays in receiving environmental approvals;
- the global financial crisis; and
- · a significant reduction in the magnetite pellet price.

In May this year the Southdown Joint Venture requested our team begin progressing with the project approvals again.

In order to determine whether the proposed transmission line route from Muja to Wellstead is still the most suitable option, we are undertaking a number of investigations to ensure we have considered all the social, environmental, technical and economic issues. This includes investigating the feasibility of rebuilding and upgrading the existing southern 132 kV transmission line from Muja to Kojonup to increase its capacity to deliver more power.

The investigations will take place in the coming months along the proposed line route and the existing southern 132 kV transmission line from Muja to Kojonup. The purpose of the investigations is to determine the project's environmental and visual impacts. This will allow the environmental approvals to re-commence and appropriate management strategies to be created.

As part of the assessments Western Power and their contractors will require access to landowner's properties on or after Monday 20 September 2010. All landowner's will be contacted prior to entry on to their property.


